## How to Know Delft.

The first and most prominent earmark of delft china is that of color. Everybody knows that delft is blue, but it must not be too blue. The genuine article is as hard as porcelain, and its natural color is a pure white. The only thing that should be blue is the figure or design, and the production of this deep indigo tint is one of Holland's cherished secrets.

The trademark which is best known on the delft plate consists of an oddly shaped U surmounting an F. What this mark really signifies is long since forgotten, says the House Furnishing Review.

Another test of delft is its ring. You do not need to eat off a delft plate with a pair of ice tongs to hear the true porcelain ring. Strike it with your fingers while admiring the Dutch characteristics of the design.

No machine ever made a delft decoration, and the modern article is most readily distinguished by its uniformity of design.

Keep Them Looking Fresh.

There are three things in every home which should never be permitted to show signs of a former use. One of these is the dining room table, one the bedroom and one the bathroom. Each of them should always suggest having just been made ready for some one's convenience.

This is especially true of a bathroom. Everything in it should shine like the crystal and silver of a dinner table, and be as fresh as scouring can make it.
