Cheap Fruit Cake.
Cream well together a cupful of brown sugar and a scant half cupful of butter and beat in a quarter of a teaspoonful of salt, a teaspoonful of cinnamon, a slight grating of nutmeg, a half teaspoonful of cloves and a cupful of seedless raisins. Into a cupful of thick apple sauce made with tart apples and unsweetened silt a tablespoonful of baking soda. To the creamed ingredients add a cupful of flour, the foaming sauce and as much more flour as will make a stiff dough. Turn into a loaf pan lined with greased paper and bake in a moderate oven from fifty minutes to an hour, according to thickness. Table Talk.

Pegged Boots In Canada.
There are few, if any, pegged boots made in the factories of the United States, while fifty years ago the sewing machine and the hand-sewn shoe were nearly all shoes and the hand-sewn shoe was hobbled or pegged. In Canada there are a few scattering factories producing pegged boots for men and boys. Adam Bertsch, a Rochester pattern manufacturer, recently ran across one at St. John's, Nfld.

Mr. Bertsch was interested in the great interest of the shoe industry in the United States, which the boots and shoes are manufactured in the factory in use being long out of date, as compared with the present standard in the United States. There are no up-to-date methods, and one might easily imagine in stepping into this factory that the cycle of time had turned back forty or fifty years. The pegged boots are high out, such as men were generally before the war, and find a ready sale in Newfoundland and in Canada.—From the Shoe Retailer.

Young Girls Sold In Marriage.
Mrs. T. Chisholm, Montreal, reporting recently to the Dominion Women's Christian Temperance Union convention on foreign work, denounced child marriage, practiced among Germans, Gaiques and Poles in Moscow. She instanced a case of a thirteen-year-old girl forced to marry a man much older, whom she had never seen till the week before the marriage ceremony. The father's young wife was paid \$25 or \$30 by the prospective groom. The girls were practically sold by hard-up parents. She knew cases of fourteen-year-old girls being compelled to marry under similar circumstances. The Attorney-General had been appealed to on the matter, but it was difficult to stop child marriage unless they could get a case for prosecution through the girl refusing to say yes at the marriage altar.

HISTORY OF ASTRONOMY.

How We Learned What We Know About the Heavens.

The first of a series of lectures at the Biological Building of the University of Toronto to be given to the students upon subjects not fully dealt with in the curriculum was delivered by Prof. Baker on "The History of Astronomical Knowledge." The lecture was very entertaining, and was attended by a large number of students, and as was published was also attended by a number of outsiders. Prof. Baker dealt first with the appearances in the heavens which would have presented themselves to the notice of early astronomers. There were three of these appearances which would have been particularly noticeable. One was the fact that the planets all moved in the same direction about the sun. Another was the fact that the earth moved on its own axis. The motion of the planets in an ellipse was another appearance which presented itself for explanation, and it could easily be understood that they needed considerable acuteness of observation for their solution. There were several passages in the "Odyssey" which gave evidence of more than ordinary knowledge of the motion of the heavenly bodies. Prof. Baker dealt with the passages which served to illustrate the point. The early astronomers had been unaware of the chief cause of the appearance which they were trying to explain; namely, the motion of the earth with them on it.

The earliest conception of the universe that had deserved the name of a "theory" was that the stars were fixed in a crystalline sphere, which during the day revolved about the earth from east to west. The motion of the sun and moon from west to east, however, had also to be accounted for, and this was done by simply multiplying the spheres in which the planets moved. This hypothesis, however, was not so simple as it seemed, and it was not until the increased perception of appearances; by the theories of eccentric spheres and epicycles.

The system of Ptolemy had made the sun the centre of movement around which the planets revolved. Subsequent developments had been due to the use of the telescope. The genius of Newton had shown that the planets being detained in their orbits by the force of an attraction in the sun. Finally, the secret had been found in the heavens and the law of gravitation had been discovered. The law alone, however, was discovered. What gravitation itself was had still to be learned.

An Aristocrat Turns Hermit.
Reports to the Mounted Police Department bring accounts of very interesting lives followed by people living in the western part of Canada. Some of the inhabitants have gone there to endure hardships in preference to living in comfort in fashionable English homes.

In a report received recently by the Mounted Police from the N.W.M.P. there is an interesting account of the finding of a strange individual camped alone nineteen miles from Selkirk.

The man, from John Taylor, Inspector of Division of the Mounted Police, was sent last summer to meet the police steamer Vidette, and on his way an isolated camp was sighted. On entering the camp, Mr. Taylor says he believes the stranger is a son of a baron of England, who at one time was a Lieutenant in the King's Royal Rifle Corps. His only companions were three dogs and a cat. He was crippled by the result of an accident many years ago. He gave no information about his previous life.
