### Is This Pertinent?

#### WHERE SHALL THE RAILWAY RUN?

The mind of the people has been absorbed so much in the question of securing the Valley Railway that the matter of its location through Carleton county has not been a public issue. Badly as the railway is needed the location by the last survey would render it a sectional benefit almost altogether. Situated near the boundary line as the survey is, the road would be certain to get all the traffic west of it, but there could not be any reasonable expectation of getting the traffic from more than half the territory between the road and the river.

Should the road follow the river bank throughout it would be certain of getting all the traffic of the west side of the river and a share of that from the east.

The county would receive no injury from the road running along the western bank of the river but the villages along the C. P. R. would be stunted in their development if the road follows the present survey. Presuming the river north of Woodstock divides evenly the population of the county, it is a question, if the matter were put to vote, if the road would suit all concerned by running so far toward the boundary line. The OBSERVER does not want to take sides in an issue of this kind but it asks every reader of this paper these two questions:

Do you want the railway to go the back route?  
Do you want the railway to go the river route?

#### Meetings at Florenceville.

There were two interesting meetings held on Tuesday, the 16th inst. in the Consolidated school building, Florenceville. In the afternoon, in the domestic science room, Miss Elliot, of Galt (Ont.), spoke in behalf of women's institutes, presenting some of the helpful advantages they afford. Mrs. Dunbrack, of Fredericton, domestic science demonstrator of the department of agriculture, gave a clear and effective address on the cooking of meats.

In the evening a well attended meeting was held in the assembly hall. W. A. Taylor was in the chair. W. W. Hubbard, secretary of agriculture, gave a brief address and introduced the other speakers. Mrs. Dunbrack advocated women's institutes; Miss Elliot spoke on the literature our girls should read; S. Jones, of Sussex, spoke on poultry.

Andrew Elliot, of Galt, spoke along educational lines. Principal Simms advocated a board of control for sports, the teams to be limited to members of the school, and no member of the school to be allowed in the team until he had attained a certain degree of excellence in study.

The rain yesterday and today is just what the thirsty country needs, and is gladly welcomed.

#### Woodworking Factory a Sure Thing.

Under the name of the "Hartland Woodworking Co." application has been made for incorporation of J. T. G. Carr, D. H. Nixon, A. G. Baker, S. S. Miller, W. D. Keith, W. H. Keyes, J. E. McCollom, M. L. Hayward, Lorne MacIntosh, H. R. Nixon, F. N. Clark, R. J. Potts, W. C. Craig, J. K. Flemming, G. B. Nixon, and Ziba Orser, all of Brighton, Carleton county. The capital stock is to be \$15,000.

A crew of men have been at work for two weeks overhauling the old woodworking factory. A new boiler of 80 horse power capacity is to be put in, and whatever of new machinery is required to equip the plant in first class shape.

W. H. Keyes who has had experience in Woodstock and Campbellton, where he was burned out last year, will have the management of the factory and be working foreman.

Half a dozen men will be employed and the Company is assured of all the work they can handle.

It is indeed a splendid thing for the village to have this work going on and is indicative of the progress the town is enjoying.
