Horses to be Named Sept. 7th.

The final payment, when horses must be named, will be due on Tuesday, Sept. 7th, on which date entries in the class races will also close.

The stake for trotters of four years old and under has been officially declared off and in its place has been offered a 3 minute trot class race for a purse of \$300. Entries in this race will close on Tuesday, Sept. 7th when other entries close. In all class races

records made after the original closing date, Friday, Sept. 3rd, will not be a bar.

P. E. ISLAND TIMING.

Remarks of a Halifax Racing Critic Upon What He Describes as Remarkable Racing.

The Halifax Recorder says: The rules or harness racing provide that drivers must not carry watches, so that they have to depend solely on themselves if they do not wish to lower their horses records; but such would not be required if all races were like those at Montague, P. E. I., last Saturday, as no matter how slow the class was, the winners still remained in their classes, though going within small fractions of a second of having a new record.

In the free-for-all Open D. 2.27, defeated Mamie P. and Mable T. in 2.27 3/4, 2.27 1/2 and 2.26 3/4. This is no unusual occurrence in this class, but in the 2.40 trot, with six starters, there were five heats, and every heat was from 2.39 1/4 to 2.40 1/4. Grace Mack won the first heat in 2.39 1/4; Lady Coghlan the second and third heats in 2.39 3/4, 2.40 1/4, and Minnie Mack the next two in 2.39 1/2, 2.40.

Even more remarkable was the time in the 3 minute class, which Hilda S. won from six starters in straight heats in 2.59 1/4, 2.59 3/4, 3.00.

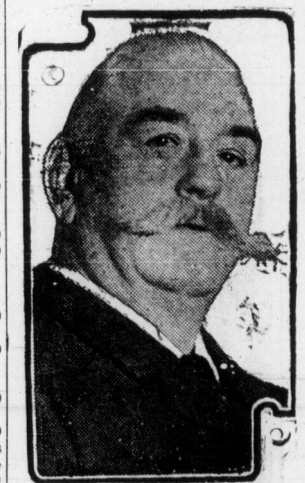
