THE ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION.

A Lot of Them Lies Unclaimed at Post Office,

London, Dec. 20.—The Antarctic expedition which is to act out from Scotland next year will be a peculiarly national one. The whole of the money subscribed toward it has been given by Scotchmen, and the scientific staff and the ship's officers and crew are of the same race. The ship is a Norwegian whaler, but as it is being brought to the Clyde it will certainly be stamped with the Scottish character by the time it is fitted out. This will be accomplished about the beginning of August, when the Hecla will go for a trial trip in the Atlantic, to test the gear and instruments. Mr. W. S. 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
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
