For the first two years of the Civil War, the North depended for her men on voluntary enlistment. In 1863 under President Lincoln, without doubt one of the greates: without doubt one of the greates; statesmen this continent has produced, conscription became necessary if the North was to prevail. The government enforced the new system with firmness, even to the point of shooting a few who made determined resistance to the enforcement of the Act.


