

of the American Consul at Canton was permitted to enter the great leper colony of the province of Canton, where no other white man had ever been. There are between 50. 000 and 60,000 lepers in this colony, which is noted for being the most loathsome on earth. Canton's vast population is so dense that fil h breeds this dreed disease at a startling rate. In the city of Canton alone there are 1,800,000 people, and the streets are pover more than six feet wide ; oftener only three feet wide.

Each leper is allowed by the Government only one cent a day for sustenance. Father Conrardy says the lepers of the colony are inclined to be industrious, and with the pittance from the Government he hopes to enable them to provide for themselves quite plentifully, compared with the wretched state they are now reduced to as a result of mis guided efforts or lack of co-operation.

Before going to his work Father Conrardy expects to canvas the East for assistance to place the leper col ony in fair condition. If he secures ough money he will buy a tract of


