THE INCREASE IN CARS.

Statement Showing That There Are Better Facilities for Handling the Grain.

Winnipeg, Nov. 18.—The figures show that there are now estimated to be stored at interior points 6,183,730 bushels of grain as against 18,708,686 bushels last year, and 12,150,500 bushels in 1905.

More Direct Loading. In view of the very frequent statements made relative to car shortages for grain shipment in the west, an investigation was made, and from the company's viewpoint it would appear that there are more cars at grain stations available for loading this year than there have ever been before.

BANKS WILL MOVE LOW GRADE WHEAT

Conference With Finance Minister Fielding Results in Action to Relieve Congestion.

Montreal, Nov. 19.—The Canadian banks will together make an effort to get as much low grade wheat as possible across the lakes before the close of navigation. This is the result of a further meeting between Hon. Mr. Fielding and the leading bankers, after the previous officials of the milling companies had stated what had to be done in order to relieve the situation.

WATER TANK COLLAPSED.

\$35,000 Damage Caused by Fall of Tank in Toronto.

Toronto, Nov. 20.—With the collapse of a tank containing fifteen thousand gallons of water this evening at twenty minutes to six, about \$35,000 damage was done to the factory building of H. Hees, Sons & Co., manufacturers of window shades and upholstery goods.

Four Men Killed in Toronto. Water-works Tunnel. Cage Dropped 100 Feet.

Toronto, Nov. 20.—Four men were killed and three injured, one probably fatally last night, at the water-works tunnel, when the cage, containing four men, was dropped 100 feet.

Winona, Minn., Nov. 20.—Daniel Sinclair, aged 76 years, who held the distinction of being the oldest editor in Minnesota, died at his home in Winona today.

Ball in Subterranean Suite.

London, November 20.—The famous underground ballroom in Whitebeck Abbey, which was excavated by the fifth Duke of Portland, and which has not been used for many years, will be the scene of a brilliant ball tomorrow night in honor of King Alfonso and his wife, Queen Victoria.

R. R. Jamieson Goes to Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Nov. 20.—R. R. Jamieson, general superintendent of the C. P. R. at Calgary, has been appointed general superintendent here, and Alford Price, of Winnipeg, has been appointed his successor at Calgary.

Mint Closed Down.

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—The Ottawa branch of the Royal mint has been closed and the proclamation declaring it open under Prince at Calgary. Among other changes Saskatoon is made a divisional point.

No Motive for Crime.

Selkirk, Nov. 20.—An inquest was commenced by Coroner Ross this afternoon into last night's tragedy in Little Britain, where Max Bialko was shot and instantly killed by his brother Paul. The jury was summoned at the home of the deceased man. Evidence was given by those who were present when the shooting took place.

Wind Storms on the Lakes.

Port Arthur, Nov. 20.—The S.S. Ionic was stopped at Jackfish bay with two life boats and another ship with two funnels, by the S.S. Manitoba, which arrived today. Severe snow and wind storms have been raging. The Ionic will evidently pull through and is heading down the lake looking for shelter. It is possible she is partly disabled and may take some time to reach port.

Kingston Contractor Dead.

Kingston, Nov. 20.—Adam Williamson a prominent contractor of this city, died today.

SOCIETY OF EQUITY'S RELATION TO LABOR

Members at Meeting in Calgary Divided on Co-Operation—R. C. Owens, Edmonton, Elected President.

Calgary, Nov. 18.—On Saturday the third annual convention of the Canadian Society of Equity was closed. The morning sitting discussed relations with the Trades and Labor Congress. Brother Wood strongly recommended that the society refrain from joining forces with the labor movement on principles involved, arguing that the farmer was an employer and not a worker.
