Self Confessed King of Thieves

Whose Pupils, he Declares, Stole \$5,000,000 a Year, Starts Uproar in New York's Underworld.

New York, July 4.—Five million dollars a year, perhaps a little more, so the New York Merchants' Association declares, is the cash value of the loot that has been passing directly or indirectly through the hands of Isadore Rader and his now famous "arsony trust," which has been operating peacefully for at least ten years on the East Side.

This modern Fagan, now in the Tombs, has been the sole professor in a formidable school of vice, teaching the fine art of stealing on a big scale, aided and abetted by certain first-rank detectives, according to corroborative testimony furnished the district attorney following Rader's astounding testimony.

Working in conjunction with these "schooled" truck thieves and pick-pockets, Rader confesses, big jobbers, auctioneers, trusted dock watchmen, shipping clerks and many women were a part of this gigantic trust which Rader conducted ostensibly as a respectable business man from his pool and billiard hall on the East Side.

In appearance Isadore Rader is a real Dickens character. He looks just as if he stepped out of a first edition of "Oliver Twist."

His power has rested chiefly in his ability to avoid arrest and conviction, not only of himself but of his confederates, who, like magic, at the will of their chief, have been removed from prison, often without trial and always without sentence.

His pupils followed his bidding with fear and trembling. His authority has been undisputed. All thieves examined by the district attorney since his confessions declare that it was absolutely necessary for any "fence" wishing to do business to "see" Rader, before they could hope for protection.

The chief aids to Rader's "scholarship" were receiving clerks on the docks and trusted watchmen, who got their "piece" of silver in a match box, when they asked for a light, or by other ingenious ways, before turning deaf ears and blind eyes to the truck thieves' operations, which often amounted to \$10,000 in a single haul. The booty being disposed of to "fences," auctioneers,

jobbers, and the inferior quality of materials were often bartered in small lots to hard-bargaining push-cart vendors at the rate of ten, fifteen and sometimes as high as twenty cents on the dollar.

It would seem that the entire underworld is involved, judging from the number visiting the district attorney's office in the hope of turning state's evidence. Each one examined either corroborates the story of the preceding ones or offers new revelations.

Dividing The Scott Relief Fund.

London, July 8.—The committee of the Mansion House Scott fund, which now amounts to \$375,000, has decided to appropriate \$170,000 for the relief of the families of those who lost their lives in the Polar expedition. Lady Scott will receive \$42,500, her son, Peter, \$17,500; Captain Scott's mother and two sisters \$30,000; Mrs. Wilson, the widow of Dr. Edward A. Wilson, \$42,500; Mrs. Bowers, widow of Lieut. R. R. Bowers, and her two daughters, \$22,500; Mrs. Evans, widow of Petty Officer Evans, and her three children, \$3,250. Several minor sums will also be awarded to others connected with the expedition.

Out of the fund additional sums will be allotted as follows: For the publication of the scientific results of the expedition, \$87,500; future polar research \$50,000; to make good a deficiency in the cost of the expedition, \$25,500; for a memorial to the dead, \$50,000.

Dispute Leads To Death.

Chicago, July 3.—A dispute over the value of a college education resulted in the death of Henry A. Edman, 54 years of age, street car conductor. He was knocked down by Edward Shaw, 23 years old, suffered a fractured skull and later died. Shaw was arrested.

Scientific Men of Many Nations

WILL GATHER IN CANADA.

Toronto, July 8.—Through the medium of the thirty-one excursions, arranged to be run in connection with the International Geological Congress delegates who will come from practically all the civilized parts of the globe, will see nearly all sections of Canada.

The Congress meets in Toronto from August 7 to August 14, and 12 excursions take place before the meetings, while ten come during the sessions, and nine after.

Some idea of the cosmopolitan nature of the gathering here may be had from knowledge of the fact that thirty-six countries were represented at the last Congress, which was held in Sweden in 1910, with 625 members attending. This is the first time Canada has been honored by the Congress. Only once has it met in the United States, that being in 1891.

To Advance Knowledge Concerning the Earth.

The excursions will be devoted to the study of mineral deposits and geological conditions and of the flora and fauna of the sections visited.

The object of the Congress itself is the advancement of knowledge concerning the earth, both in the fields of pure geological science, and in its application to the arts and industries through the association, and co-operation of the leading geologists and engineers of all nations.

Canada is likely to benefit in a marked fashion from the gathering of eminent men, who will spread to parts of the world the information they gather concerning this country's resources and possibilities. These men are the advisers of capital, the writers of text-books and authoritative articles, and the instructors in universities and schools, and their influence is sure to be felt in many directions.

After the Congress is over, a trans-continental trip has been arranged over the C.P.R. and C.N.R. and another over the C.P.R., G.T.P., and National Transcontinental lines, both lasting twenty-three days with side trips to Victoria and Rossland, B.C.

Other trips are across Lakes Erie and Huron; into the New Ontario mining districts; to Yukon and Malaspina; and to Prince Rupert and Skeena River, B.C.

Moving Pictures

To be Used by Methodist Church—A Chain of Theatres Proposed for All the Cities of Canada.

Toronto, July 8.—That the Canadian Methodist Church has gone into the moving-picture business and hopes eventually to possess a chain of theatres in all the principal cities of Canada, is the statement made here by a morning paper to-day.

The movement started in Vancouver, where an option is held on a site on which it is proposed to erect a \$100,000 building for the showing of educational and humorous films and for institutional work.

Dr. F. C. Stephenson, head of the Methodist Young People's work, stated last night that he was going to England this summer to negotiate with several firms and missionary societies with the object of forming a film exchange and association, as sufficient funds are forthcoming. A special operator will be sent to eastern countries to make exclusive pictures for the Canadian Methodists.

Militants Burn Sir W.H. Lever's Residence

London, July 8.—An "arson squad" of militant suffragettes set fire to and caused the destruction of the country residence of Sir William H. Lever, the founder of Port Sunlight, and the chairman of the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine, early this morning.

The mansion, which is called "The Bungalow," is situated at Rivington, near Horwich, Lancashire. It was not occupied by the family, but contained valuable paintings and other precious objects, all of which were consumed by the flames.
