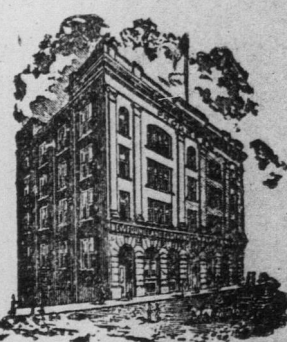

Lightning Destroys Station House.

About 5 a.m. Sunday the station house at Placentia Junction was struck by lightning and as a result was quickly burned to the ground. The station agent, Mr. A. T. Whelan, who was asleep in the building at the time had a narrow escape from death. The current entered the office by the telegraph wires, and was of such force that the building shook from its foundations and opening in the centre took fire immediately. The explosion awakened the agent who hurriedly made his escape, but all his efforts to save the contents of the office were futile, as that section of the building was most affected by the current and was quickly aflame. Mr. Whelan, however, managed to save some personal belongings which were in another part of the building. When the explosion occurred residents of that locality hurried to the scene but nothing could be done save watch the destruction of the little station, which was burned within an hour.

A temporary house is already being constructed to replace this station, and will be ready within a few days.

Allan Liners Reach Port.

The R.M.S. Pomeranian, Capt. MacDonald, arrived here from Philadelphia at 9 o'clock last night, bringing 600 tons of cargo and one passenger in saloon, Mr. J. J. Maher. The passage took six days.
The R.M.S. Carthianian, Captain Ogilvie, entered port this morning. She was eleven days on the run from Liverpool and encountered much ice about 150 miles off and was detained in consequence. She brought 506 tons of cargo, a large mail, and as saloon passengers:—Mr. Isbister, Miss Fellows, Miss Miss Negus, J. J. Tobin, Mrs. Browning, Jas. Ryan, Mrs. E. S. McEwan, W. E. Whitaker, 7 intermediate and three in steerage.

Cable News.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

Practically nothing can be recovered by those who lost their relatives or baggage in the Titanic disaster, as a result of the decision by the Supreme Court, which held that the liability of Oceanic Steam Navigation Company against the \$13,000,000 claims against it as owners of the Titanic is limited in suits, on the States by the American Limited Liability law of 1851 to the value of the salvage recovered and to freight and passage money received on the Titanic voyage, that amount in all to about \$8,000.

LONDON, To-day.

By a vote of 351 to 247 and a majority of 77, was read a third time the Irish Home Rule Bill and the measure passed on the Lords. The end of the struggle came quite suddenly, the Unionists refusing to debate the Bill without further information as to the Government's intentions in regard to proposed amending measure. The Premier lifted a corner of the veil, but thought the Leader of the Opposition admitted the Premier's words were as conciliatory as usual, he hastened to add that Asquith had not told them anything to discuss a third reading under the circumstances would, he said, be futile and ridiculous. He added, "Let the curtain ring down on the contemptible farce. It is only the end of an act. The Government can carry a Bill through Parliament, but the concluding act of the drama will be in a country where an appeal to the people will not end in a farce." Law then remarked that when the Government was unable to obtain a seat in Parliament for a member of the Cabinet, meaning Masterman, an appeal to the country evidently was not far off.

After a brief speech by the Premier, in which he defended the Government against the charge of ignoring the rights of the minority and adjusting the balance of power between parties by means of the Parliament Act, he concluded that he was introducing an Amending Bill, not because he thought the Irish Home Rule measure was bad or imperfect, but because he was anxious for peace. The vote was then taken. The announcement of the figures brought

out a great demonstration by the Nationalists and Liberals. The division was taken strictly on party lines. The followers of William O'Brien abstained from voting, O'Brien expressing the view that the Premier's action was not straight dealing either with England or Ireland.
