The Prime Minister's careful use of words suggest a confidence as to the developments of the future which cannot be mistaken. It would not be wise, says the Daily News, to inquire too closely as to the nature of these developments, but certain facts are before us which seem to have a collective bearing on the future course of events. FIRECE FIGHTING AROUND WAR-

LONDON, July 21. A series of great battles, the resul of which will seal the fate of Warsaw, are now being fought north, west and south of that city. Having success, fully retired to positions on the rivers, and being well flanked by fort resses, the Russians have turned, and are fighting desperately to stem the Austro-German onslaught. To the Austro-German onslaught. To the north of the River Narew they delivered yesterday three fierce counter-attacks from the fortresses of Bozan, Pultusk and Novo Georgievak. The Germans, who had taken one of the outer works of Bozan, repulsed these counter-attacks, according to the official report received from Berlin to-night, but have apparently been unable to make any further progress southward. ofthward.
Immediately west of Warsaw or

what is known as the Blonie Grojec Line, the Russians suffered a reverse retreating towards the Vistula. Fur-ther south the army of General Von retreating towards the Vistula. Further south the army of General Von Woyrich is making progress toward the same river which has been reached at one point. To the south of Ivangerod Field Marshal Von MacKenzen who is directing the offensive between the Vistula and the Bug, have reached the Russian lines. Here the greatest of all the battles is being fought for the possession of Lublin Chalm railway. On the resistance the Russians are able to offer along this front where the Austro-Germans are making their biggest effort, probably depends the success or failure of the Austro-German operations. Apparently the Austro-German' feel pretty certain of the outcome, for it is said that Emperor William, who is at Posen, has sent for the Empress in order to make a state entry into the Polish capital when it falls. Things are moving a little more quickly at Courtand where the Germans claim to have met with successes all along the line, bringing them within striking distance of Riga and roads which supply that town from the south. There is another battle in progress along the borders of Bessarabla, but how this is going the official communications do not say.
