"I cannot afford it." We all say that at one time or another, of things to be bought with money. That is, all but a few unimaginably rich folks, and I suppose even they sometimes want something like the Koh-i-noor diamond, and find they cannot afford it.

But how often do we remember to say "I cannot afford it" of things that are not bought with money?

A woman whom I know had bought some goods which she found out afterwards she did not want.

She Knew a Good Way Out Of The Difficulty.

She Couldn't Afford To Be Unfair.

Later, when the woman who had given her the worldly-wise advice had gone and we were talking the matter over, she said, "It means a loss of

That's what I mean by not being able to afford things that are not bought with money.

Some things are worth more than they can possibly cost. Other things cost more than they can possibly be worth. Anything which involves loss of self-respect, a lowering of standards, a compromising of what you know is right (remember, however, that it is very difficult sometimes to define right), belongs in this class.

A Rule of Conduct.

The cost may be dear in money, in friends, in influence, in labor, in a prolonged and painful sacrifice; but the cost not to do right is far more severe; you pay in the integrity of your manhood, in honor, in truth, in character. A New Job.

Lord Murray of Elibank has a new "Job." He has held a good many in his day and has made good at all of them. Lord Murray is now team mate with Lord Derby and is out after recruits for the government's army. There are now upwards of two million men engaged in the government munition works, but Lord Murray plans to have this number greatly increased. He is regarded as one of the best organizers in Great Britain. For some time he was chief liberal whip and head of the Liberal party machine and then appointed to the patronage secretaryship of the treasury. Some three or four years ago Lord Murray retired from the House of Commons and joined the firm of S. Pearson & Company, who have large interests in Canada, the United States, Mexico and South America. He reorganized the company's interests in these countries and put them on a better basis returning to England shortly before the outbreak of the war. The first Lord Elibank, created a peer by Charles the First, was given a grant of land in Nova Scotia. He did not consider the property of any value and consequently never laid claim to it. Since that time, however, that province has been pretty well taken possession of by other Scotchmen.
