CAMPAIGN NEWS ITEMS.

Campaign headquarters in the Board of Trade Building, is a busy place these days. There are different committees meeting almost hourly. The Executive Committee of the Joint Campaign meets practically every afternoon or evening. There are three young ladies who are tabulating names of prospective givers to the fund. Detailed plans, printed matter, and whatever relates to the Campaign is concentrated in this office.

Much interest has been aroused by the College pictures that have been displayed in the windows of Campaign headquarters. The pictures consist of teams of by-gone days and there is much speculation who the different boys in the pictures are. Other groups will be added, and it is also probable that there will be other windows used for such display.

The organization of the Campaign is rapidly taking form now. The Four Division Chairmen have been named as follows: Women's Division—Mrs. Frank Steer and Mrs. S. T. Harrington. Men's Division—Mr. R. F. Horwood and Mr. H. N. Burt. Each of these Division Chairmen will or have already secured four Captains, and each Captain in turn will secure eleven for their team.

The Men's Division Chairmen and Captains will meet at Campaign headquarters this evening to choose names for prospective team workers. It is expected that by the end of the week a number of the teams will be filled.

Much favorable comment has been heard in many parts of the city with reference to the combined effort. On Sunday in the churches (Methodist), the ministers and in several cases laymen, spoke on the matter, more fully explaining the far-reaching effects that the Campaign should have. It is expected that the by-products from the merging of common strength for a single purpose will bring a greater spirit of co-operation, and will make it easier for all future efforts.

Recently there was held a meeting of Methodist school teachers in St. John's to consider in what manner the pupils in the schools could be given an opportunity to have a part in this educational enterprise. They determined on what has been named "The Earn and Give" plan. Each boy and girl will be given the opportunity to be one of 500 who will either save from their allowances, or earn a certain amount per year. The teachers will form the committee. Mr. W. H. Peters is chairman of this committee. There will be honor rolls placed in the school rooms with the names of contributors.

Hawker and Grievé.

When the news came that the Australian, Hawker, and the Englishman, Grievé, had soared into the air at St. John's in their frail biplane and sped away on their perilous attempt to fly the Atlantic, without patrolling ships to guide and aid them, without even a pontoon to float them if they were forced down to the sea's surface, the heart of every red-blooded man leaped in his breast. That picture of the daring shipmates dropping the under-carriage which was used in making the start and would have served to make a landing in Ireland safe, and sweeping out to sea above the Newfoundland cliffs, resolved to do or die on the sea and take the risk of disaster if they ever reached Ireland, will live in the memory. The risk was desperate, but the spirit was the spirit that is stronger than fears of the flesh and triumphs over it, so that full success becomes of minor importance when the record is made up.

If, as now seems apparent, their feat is hardly less remarkable than if they had actually reached Ireland. They have come nearer to accomplishing a "transatlantic flight" (the term is somewhat ambiguous) than any one else, and have established a distance record for non-stop flying. It is to be hoped that the eleventh-hour succor sent by the Admiralty will have been in time to save both men alive and in good health.—N. Y. Times.

Until the rise of the curtain at 8.30 last evening, until its fall at 11.15, the capacity audience at the Casino Theatre was enthralled by the splendid rendition of the high class entertainment, "The Mikado." Mr. S. O'Leary as The Mikado was splendid, and gained unstinted applause by his perfect interpretation of a difficult role. Mr. P. Dobbin as Nanki-Poo was equally good, his solo singing of the wandering minstrel winning rounds of applause. Mr. Perote Jardine as Lord High Executioner, was magnificent. He caught at once the attention of the audience, and held it to the end, keeping the gathering in roars of laughter. Mr. W. Wallace, as Lord High Everything, was perfectly at home, giving as he has given for the past four years a rendition not to be excelled by the professional stage man. Mr. J. Hickey made his debut as Pish Tush, and was at his ease all through, making a most favorable impression. Masters Ryall, Galgaly and Knight as the "three little maids" were beautiful, their singing and acting winning unstinted applause. Master Stan, Carew as Katsche—a most difficult role—acquitted himself most creditably and in conjunction with Mr. Jardine contributed to the humorous and dramatic effect of the entertainment. The stage setting and scenic effects were much admired.

GIVING SERVICES OR

How many people do not realize the difference in the quality of work demanded from the paid and the unpaid worker!

A man who has a very capable wife was talking to me one day about what she would do if anything happened to him.

"I'm sure Ethel would be perfectly capable of supporting the children," he said. "You know she's a mighty smart woman."

Naturally I agreed and then ventured to ask just what line of work he would expect her to take up.

"No Thought She Would Step Into A Good Executive Position."

"Well, I think some good executive position would be the sort of thing she'd shine in," he said. "You know she's been treasurer of the D-Club for four years and was president of the F-8 (naming two large women's clubs) for two terms, and you know what she's done in war work, and she's always running some big affair and making a howling success of it. She ought to step right into some good executive position."

Now his wife is a very smart woman, and doubtless the work she has done would be preparation for executive work, but as to her stepping right into a good executive position,—well that is another story. For it is one thing to give one's service to a social organization and quite another thing to sell them to a business organization.
