Excavations Uphold the Bible

Finds in Syria Tend to Confirm Many Incidents.

PHILADELPHIA — Old Testament scenes and life, portrayed in the books of Samuel and Chronicles, in which King Saul figures in combat with the ancient Philistines, are revealed in a new light by recent excavations in Palestine by the Pennsylvania University Museum's expedition to Belsham. A description of the work there is contained in a letter from Alan Rowe, field director of the expedition.

The excavations carried out since 1921 have reached a point where it is possible to appraise the value of the finds. Belsham, the Biblical Beth-San, at the eastern end of the Valley of Jezreel, was the chief city of the famous Decapolis, or league of ten cities, all, with the exception of Scythopolis, on the east side of the River Jordan.

The high wall, or mound, now being excavated consists of a series of super-imposed cities beneath which part of a large Hellenistic temple, as well as the brick walls of a great Egyptian fort, have been revealed.

This season's work has cleared the whole of the temple, which is roughly 37 1/4 meters in length by 25 meters over all, and is similar in plan to the Roman Temple of Bacchus at Baalbek, Syria.

The fort doubtless was built by King Seti I. It was held by the Pharaohs until the time of Ramesses III, of the Twentieth Dynasty, who reigned from 1183-1157 B.C. A little after 1186 B.C., when the latter monarch came to Beth-San, and erected there a statue of himself, which was found during last season's excavations, a number of races of peoples from Crete and the south coasts of Anatolia—generally known as the Philistines—who had entered Palestine, occupied the fort until they were driven out by King David, about 1000 B.C.

Some twenty years before the latter date the Philistine who defeated King Saul of Israel upon the neighbouring Mount Gilboa hung his body to the walls of Beth-San and placed his armor in the House of the Goddess Ashtoreth. This very house of Ashtoreth has been found this season.

In a room of this house and from under its floor, which was made of hard clay, came a most important monument of basalt, dedicated by an Egyptian, named Hesi-Nekht, who lived under the Nineteenth Dynasty.

This depicts a figure of the Goddess Ashtoreth, or Anit (Anat). In front of her is Hesi-Nekht and an altar stand with a lily over it. Above her is written, "Anat, lady of heaven, mistress of all the gods," and against the man, "May the King give an offering. Anat, may she give all life, strength, and health to the double of Hesi-Nekht."

There is every evidence, the excavators say, that this house is the original house of Ashtoreth mentioned in I Samuel X, within which was hung the armor of King Saul after his death. It also is believed completely established that the temple can be ascribed to the Nineteenth Dynasty.

Another temple, possibly one erected by King Thothmes III of the Eighteenth dynasty, 1501-1447 B.C., was found beneath the Nineteenth Dynasty temple.

Only the northern end of this temple has been excavated. Among the significant things found are a statue of King Thothmes III and an altar, the latter in a small room which was colored a bright blue. In this room also was a life-size stone hawk of brilliant coloring wearing the double crown of Upper and Lower Egypt.

The temples are the only bronze-age buildings of their kind found in Palestine and were originally roofed in.

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Fox and Dog Show in C.L.B. Armoury

The fox and dog section of the 14th Annual "Poultry" show, opening on Wednesday, promises to be a very interesting exhibit. Twenty-two pure bred foxes will be arranged in twenty-two specially made coops. They comprise silver, black, red and patch foxes also some tame fox pups.

Amongst the fox breeders exhibiting and competing for the Silver Cup Championship are Messrs. Dr. Alex. Campbell, Mr. Brandon Tilley, of Clarendon, Mr. G. Way, of Grand Falls, and Newfoundland Foxes, Ltd. These will be under the special care of Doctor Bishop, Veterinary Surgeon, and will be on show in the gymnasium. The competitor gaining the Silver Cup will win by reason of having the largest number of points.

In the Newfoundland Dog section about twenty pure bred dogs and pups will be benched in specially constructed stalls. Each dog will wear a collar and owners will provide a chain to fasten each animal in its appointed place. The dogs will likely be given a prominent place on the Armoury stage. Amongst the dog breeders showing are Dr. Bishop, V.S., Willis Reid, Dr. Alex. Campbell, S. Butler, E. A. Bowring and many others.

The Poultry Association are doing all they possibly can to encourage fox and dog breeders in breeding good animals. No doubt in time the fox and dog owners may form an association of their own when their numbers increase.

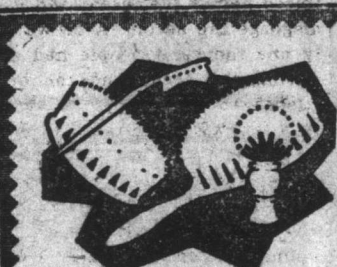
