CENTRE RIDING OF WELLINGTON.

To the Electors of the Centre Riding of Wellington.

GENTLEMEN: Having received a requisition from the most influential electors of the Riding, requesting me to put in nomination for the Riding of Wellington, in compliance with the provisions of the Act in that behalf, I now offer myself as a candidate for the representation of the Riding.

My address has been given in the Riding. To it I would refer you for the political topics that I have to offer to the country, also for my views on the Legislative Assembly, and on the duties of the new state of the Confederation Bill.

I shall endeavor to be as time shall permit, at the meetings that I have to attend, on which I shall be glad to receive from you, or from any of the electors, any suggestions that may be made on the political
