REV. HENRY WARD BEECHER.
This distinguished divine, accompanied by his wife, passed through Hamilton on Thursday last, on his way to New York. The object of his visit was to obtain a copyright for his celebrated novel, "No. 13." Such a right can only be obtained by a native or resident of Canada; but the length of residence is not specified, so that a single day may suffice. Mr. Beecher improved his business journey, however, for the purpose of seeing as much of Canada as the limited time that he could be absent from his own pulpit (a single Sabbath) would permit. He visited Quebec, examined objects of interest about Montreal, remained a day in Toronto, and also paid a visit to his son, who is in business as a lumber merchant at Bell Ewart, on Lake Simcoe.

THE KINGSTON MURDER.—The morbid sympathy which is often felt for the most hardened wretches, is just now being exemplified in the case of "Saxie" Allan, the Kingston murderer. Strange as it may appear to people accustomed to consider the deliberate killing of a fellow-creature the highest crime against both divine and human law, it is none the less true that petitions asking the commutation of the righteous sentence passed upon the wretch who in a moment sent poor Driscoll to eternity, are now receiving numerous signatures. However, it not likely executive clemency will interpose on Allan's behalf. At this rate murder will soon be regarded as a trivial offence.

ENGLISH TELEGRAPH LINES.—The cable informs us that the government has resolved to place all the telegraph lines of Great Britain under the immediate direction of the post office department.

TURKISH NEWSPAPER IN LONDON.—A phenomenon which one scarcely expected to see has now made its appearance on the horizon of London journalism—a Turkish newspaper, printed in Turkish, edited by a Turkish exile, and going into circulation for the cause of free government and progress in Turkey. Number five of this publication is now out. It is elegantly printed, and indeed is, as far as appearance goes, quite an attractive little paper, not a great deal larger than one of the Spectators of Sir Roger de Coverley's day. We are perhaps guilty of a want of proper self-respect when we confess that we are not able to read a word of the articles whereof this Turkish journal is made up. But, happily for us whose education in the matter of Turkish has been somewhat neglected, the editor has sent us along with the paper a short resume in French of its contents. From this we learn that the *Murkibir* is entirely devoted to the interests of Turkey, and that it advocates the union of all parties in Turkey to obtain from the government the reforms needed by the country.—*Star*.

FIRE IN OTTAWA.—The warehouse of Messrs. Bates & Co., grocers near the Rideau Canal, was consumed by fire on Wednesday night. The loss is estimated at over \$100,000; insurance about \$40,000. It was the work of an incendiary.

SOMETHING LIKE LIBERTY.—The people of Glasgow, Scotland, have a famous University, established so far back as the year 1450, nearly 50 years before the discovery of America. The buildings are now altogether inadequate to the requirements of the present day, and are besides situated in the worst, though it was at one time the most fashionable, portion of the city. Application was accordingly made to Parliament for a grant to assist in erecting a new College, and £20,000 was promised on condition that as much more should be raised by private subscription. The condition was answered by two subscriptions of \$50,000 each; six of \$10,000; forty of \$5,000; twenty-six of \$2,500; twenty-eight of \$1,250; eight of \$1,000; fifty-four of \$500; and nineteen of \$250 each, besides smaller sums making up an aggregate of \$600,000, subscribed for this noble purpose by Scotchmen, and the list is still open.

GLENGOWAN CHEESE FACTORY.—This factory has been in successful operation for some time says the *St. Mary's Argus*. It commenced operations on the third of June last, and closed on the 26th September, and during that time the total quantity of milk used was 439,372 lbs., which made 42,568 lbs. of cheese, showing that it took 10 1/2 lbs. of milk to make one pound of cheese. This lot was sold to Messrs. Buck, Robertson & Co., of Montreal, for 81 cents per pound. If the cheese had been kept for a few weeks longer it would have sold for 9 cents, but a considerable loss would have resulted from shrinkage. The buyers through their agent, Haskett expressed their opinion that the cheese manufactured at this factory was the best that had entered Montreal this season.
