

A CELEBRATED BRITON COMES TO CALGARY TO INVESTIGATE

Would Look Into Investments
Made by Britons in the
Canadian West

Visited Calgary Several Years
Ago and is Astounded
at Its Growth

Says Many Britishers Heavy
Holders of Calgary Real
Estate

A large eastern electrical firm will establish a big manufacturing plant in Calgary, was the statement made to the Albertan last night by Benjamin H. Morgan, F.R.S.S., M.I.A.E., Member of Council Royal Colonial Institute; Chairman of the Trade Industry Committee of the Royal Colonial Institute; Vice-Chairman of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce; Vice-President of the Nottingham Society of Engineers; Member of the Imperial Chamber of Commerce; and Chairman of the Alliance Investment Company of Canada. Limited. Mr. Morgan is stopping at the Braemar Lodge hotel, and is in Canada with a view to investigating the investments made by British capital in the west.

He has large financial interests in Calgary and in a number of other towns in western Canada. "I was in Calgary about three and a half years ago and since then the growth of Calgary has been phenomenal," stated Mr. Morgan. "It is certain that Calgary must develop into an enormous city," he continued, "every condition points in that direction."

The objects of the committee of the Royal Colonial Institute of which Mr. Morgan is chairman are to encourage and arrange industrial conferences, attended by men of affairs from all parts of the Empire, in order to discuss points of common interest in the conditions of trade and industry.

The dominant note of the Royal Colonial Institute's work is concisely described in its motto, "United Empire." The Trade and Industry Committee exists to foster, stimulate and assist British commercial and industrial interests throughout the Empire.

"The strong committee," which has lately been formed from the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in London, England, with the object of looking into western real estate propositions which are being floated in England, will be of immense use to Calgary," said Mr. Morgan. "A very large proportion of the Calgary real estate is held by British capital, and if the British investors are not treated scrupulously it will mean the closing down of capital from that source. A large amount of Calgary, Regina, Edmonton, and other western real estate has been sold in England; some of this has been misrepresented; it has not been worth the price in the agreement."

"The objects of the committee of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce will be to give advice to the prospective investors in England, and to induce all bona-fide western firms who wish to sell property in England to agree to their conditions and affiliate with them."

"In this way," continued Mr. Morgan, "not only will it prevent the British investor from being swindled, but it will also keep open a splendid market for western property in the British Isles."

"It is possible that I might be misunderstood in these remarks about the selling of Calgary real estate in England," stated Mr. Morgan, "Calgary has shown great enterprise in its efforts to interest British capital, of course there has been some misuse of the world wide reputation which Calgary enjoys, and some valueless property has been sold. Still, there are a number of the larger Calgary land firms directly represented on the English committee. This also applies to other western towns the best and largest firms are represented on our committee."

Cleveland, O., July 2.—Five years in the penitentiary was the sentence given Mrs. Rose Dworkin, who pleaded guilty in criminal court to killing Jacob Horwitz, whom she claimed had wronged her years ago in Russia, and whom she shot down on the streets of Cleveland, having followed him here after, as she alleged, he told her husband stories which resulted in his leaving her.

today, when a strong resolution was passed and a committee appointed, with power to add a number of influential laymen to its number, to take this matter up at once and secure speedy action.

The Resolution
The following was the resolution which was unanimously passed: "Resolved, that the Presbytery of Calgary places itself on record as being vehemently opposed to the giving of public exhibitions of boxing, on the

grounds that they are physically dangerous and morally degrading.

"Expresses its hearty approval of the conduct of a majority of the members of the council of the city of Calgary on a recent date in refusing to suspend the city by-law prohibiting such exhibitions;

"And appoints a committee to endeavor to secure provincial legislation whereby this form of evil may be prevented in every part of the province."

The following committee was ap-

pointed with power to add to its numbers: The Rev. A. Mahaffy, chairman; the Rev. A. D. Archibald, the Rev. A. Eiler, and George S. Dingle.

DEATH OF UNIT RULE.
When the Baltimore convention annulled the unit rule in states where direct primaries are held, it in effect killed that relic of bossism. To modify a convenience of that kind is to pronounce its doom. The convention should complete the job before adjournment.

There have been many excuses and only one true reason for the unit rule. It has magnified the power of bosses. Obstinately designed to give dignity to states, it in fact has degraded states and people. Naturally enough, its overthrow found every boss in the country voting his delegation as solidly as he could in its favor.

Even on the question of their own emancipation the unit rule held men like the 90 from New York in bondage. They had nothing to say on the subject of their deliverance. It was Chas.

Murphy who spoke for them, for the unit rule and for himself, as he spoke as the boss. A more ghastly object lesson never faced a free people.

In this demonstration in behalf of a dying abuse Democracy should see very clearly the inexorable logic of the direct primary. The bosses recognized it long ago.

Direct primaries will not usher in the perfect day, but they will destroy our political evils, they will reduce the number of traders and hucksters at conventions and they will safeguard the minority as well as majority rights.
