THE ENGLISHMEN WON.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 24.—The Oxford-Cambridge cricketers defeated the Gentlemen of Philadelphia in the match which has been in progress since Friday and which ended yesterday. The Philadelphia players scored 234 runs in their first inning, and 138 in the second—a total of 372. The Englishmen made 156 runs in their first inning, and when they went in for their second inning they wanted 217 runs to win. They scored 220 runs, with two wickets to spare. The match was a terrific one, and the Englishmen throughout the match were in progress. The Philadelphia players were present to see the concluding day's play. Next Friday, Saturday and Monday the Englishmen will play their third and deciding match with the Gentlemen of Philadelphia on the grounds of the Merion Cricket Club, at Haverford Station, Pa.

First Basemen Elliott and Pitcher Burnett, of the Galt club, are in the city taking a course at the dental college. Besides Caldwell, of Galt, is at Varsity. All three are well known association football men, and will be great acquisition to both the nine and the eleven. It remains to be seen what Hamilton and the Crescents will do.

A movement is on foot to form a joint stock company to organize a strong baseball club for next season, says the St. Thomas Times. The intention is to sell shares at \$50 each, and about \$1,500. The club will be secured, fenced in, stands erected and the grounds put in proper shape. It is probable that Wood, pitcher of the Guelph club; Humphreys, shortstop of the Galt team; Lyons, Handley, McDonald, Hutchinson, and other fast players will be secured, and the club put in the Canadian League. A team can be organized that will be a pennant winner.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 24.—It was learned last night that Attorney-General Crane is arranging to have the fight between the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight. IT'S AWAY DOWN.

Water in the Reservoir Four Feet, Four Inches Deep.

Situation Growing Serious—Commissioners Looking After Another Pond across the River.

Again the situation at the city works is becoming serious.

The water in the reservoir today was only four feet four inches deep and was slowly going down. Yesterday there was five feet. This drop has occurred notwithstanding the fact that the Grand Trunk has commenced to pump its supply from the river.

The commissioners have decided to take immediate steps to consider ways and means to surmount the difficulty. They have visited the property on the north side of the river and are talking over the advisability of securing a pond, which contains 50 feet of water and which is about 85 feet above the pump house. The commissioners think that by clearing off fourteen or fifteen feet of vegetable matter from the surface of the pond the water will be found of the purest quality. It is doubtless the feeder of many springs which bubble out in that locality, and if this moves so it may be made into a reserve reservoir, its altitude providing ample pressure. That something will have to be done without delay is certain, and the commissioners are fully alive to the situation. The pumps at the station are being used alternately and can more than handle the supply.

CHESHIRE held the palm for several years for having the largest apple tree in the country. It fell a few years ago, but the correspondent has found another to take its place. On the farm of Mr. Walter Brooks, in the east part of the town, stands an apple tree which we feel sure has few, if any, equals. The spread of the branches is about 50 feet, and the trunk from four to four and a half feet in diameter. Several huge limbs in a variety of shapes grow from the trunk. This tree has borne over 100 bushels of apples in a season, and is adjudged to be about 150 years old.—Hartford Courant.

IT WAS SLICK.

How James Wilson and a Pal "Did" Farmer Blackie

Out of \$65 On a Trick Lock Game—It Was Blackie's First Bet—Wilson Guilty of Larceny.

Farmer James Blackie, lot 19, con. 3, of Westminster township, was in the Police Court this morning to relate how he was done out of \$65 in a trick lock game by James Wilson and a pal. It was on Sept. 14 that Farmer Blackie drove to town, and after putting up at the Hodgins House, went to transact some business. When he reached the corner of King and Talbot streets, Blackie was accosted by a well dressed, smooth shaven young man, who wanted to purchase some heavy draft horses. As luck would have it, Blackie did not have his heavy draft in town, but at the stranger's request he went to the "Hodgins" stable, and saw on which he (Wilson) said he was thinking of buying. When the stall was reached the horse was gone, but Wilson gave a plausible excuse for its absence, and at the same time produced a lock, stating that he had recently lost a horse near St. Marys, but hoped that the lock, which was a new arrangement, would prevent further robberies. "Do you suppose you could open it?" was Wilson's first remark to the farmer after producing the lock.

"Well, I do not know," replied Blackie, "I hardly ever use them."

"Well," rejoined Wilson, "I will show you how it is done," and Wilson put the key into the proper slot, opened and closed the lock, and then let Blackie do the same.

"Then I will show you how it cannot be done," continued Wilson, as he removed a cover on the face of the lock and a tall man appeared and wanted to wager that he (Blackie) could not open it.

"After he sure he could, especially if Blackie had just been shown, and didn't hesitate a little bit in putting up his \$10, \$25 or double that amount," Blackie said. Wilson then put the key into the proper slot, opened and closed the lock, and then let Blackie do the same. Blackie kept one eye on his money, and the other on the lock, and when the word was given began to open the lock. It did not work as easily as before. When ten was counted the pal grabbed the money and ran through the stable and away, while Blackie stood dumbfounded at the loss of his \$65.

Such was the story as Mr. Blackie told it on oath. A pronounced modification of the story he had given when he first informed the police of his being guiled. His relation of the story was very amusing.

"What did you say to Wilson when his partner disappeared?" asked Mr. McKillop.
