Topics of Today.

Sir Richard Cartwright left Kingston today for South Oxford. Very great effort has been made to secure opposition to him, but up till now the Conservative leaders have failed. It is probable he will be elected by acclamation on Thursday next. One thing is certain, opposition would only cause needless expense.

The Toronto Globe, referring to the transference of the car shop workers to this city, and locomotive employees to Stratford, says:

"It is understood that the Grand Trunk employ at least 300 men in Toronto, but with the new order of things, not one-fifth of this number will be required."

Fully one-half of the 240 will be brought to this city. The men and their families will be warmly welcomed.

Dr. Oronhyateka asserts that Mr. McGillivray, who had a seat stolen for him in North Ontario, will resign as soon as a Speaker is elected. Why this delay? McGillivray can resign this week if he wants to do so.

The Toronto Star gives currency to a report that Mr. J. K. Kerr, Q.C., will be the next Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario. Perhaps so. But very likely the subject has not been considered by the new Government.

There are many more live matters to pass upon.

Dr. Bryce Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, complains that, in the first month in which it was in force, only about 50 per cent of the municipal clerks of the Province obeyed the new law making it obligatory on them to report monthly all deaths registered as occurring from contagious diseases. The clerks will have to do better than this if the good effects of the new law are to be realized by the people.

The many friends of Hon. Mr. Hart, Commissioner of Public Works in the Ontario Government, who has been very ill, will be glad to hear that he is so far recovered as to be able to leave for Prince Edward Island to recuperate.

The question of the validity of the appointments of Queen's Counsel by the Dominion and Provincial Governments respectively, will likely be disposed of at the Court of Appeal at its next session after the long vacation. Then will take place the argument, fixed to be heard in April, 1897, and postponed from time to time. There are three views taken as to the jurisdiction in question, viz., that the Dominion Government alone has power to appoint, that the Provincial Government alone has power, and that both Governments have concurrent power. The "Advertiser" from a layman's standpoint, holds that both the Dominion and Provincial authorities have a right to appoint Q. C.s.

SIR JOHN MILLAIS' CONDITION. London, July 28.—It is reported that Sir John Millais' death is only a question of hours. The condition of his throat renders it impossible for him to take any nourishment.

POLISH REVOLUTIONARY MOVEMENT. Berlin, July 28.—The Warsaw correspondent of the Cologne Gazette telegraphs that several arrests have been made there of persons said to be connected with an impending Polish revolutionary movement.

BAD SEAMANSHIP. London, July 28.—The British Board of Trade has decided that the loss of the steamship Drummond Castle off Ushant, on June 16, resulting in the drowning of about 250 persons, only one passenger and two seamen being saved, was due to the fact that she was not navigated with proper seamanship care, in view of the prevailing conditions.

WHAT MISS KIMBALL SAW. London, July 28.—Miss Kimball, an eye-witness of the massacre which occurred at Van in June, estimates the number of killed at 500. Ten thousand persons, she says, were rendered homeless and destitute, and were furnished protection at the American mission. Fifteen thousand took refuge under the British flag and remained for several days.

THOSE COSTLY CRUISERS. London, July 28.—The Genoese force of shipbuilders, Ansaldo, have refused to ratify the contract made by their agent with the Spanish Government for the purchase of two cruisers for \$7,000,000, and their action has caused much excitement at Madrid. It is reported that the vessels in question have been bought by the United States.

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PUGILIST JACKSON IN LIMBO. London, July 28.—Peter Jackson, the pugilist, last night created a disturbance in the Tivoli Music Hall, knocking down inoffensive bystanders after being ejected, and eventually landing in Bow street police station. He was locked up on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. At midnight he was bailed out, and was arraigned this morning to answer the charge.

WOULD MR. BLAKE ACCEPT? London, July 28.—Mr. Chamberlain has secured the sanction of the Cabinet to appoint Canadian, South African and Australian judges to the judicial committee of the Privy Council. The Cape chief justice has already been appointed. The Government here is now waiting to receive Hon. Mr. Miller's nomination of the Canadian judge. It is suggested that it would be fitting were Mr. Blake's services to the cause of Liberalism, which is now victorious, recognized by his selection.

SLAUGHTER PREVENTED. Athens, July 28.—A dispatch received here from the island of Crete says that while the National Assembly was sitting on Saturday, a panic occurred and the Turks prepared to attack the Christians, whereupon the commander of the British ironclad Hood lowered five boats with which to land a force of marines. Order was restored, however, before action became necessary.

Later reports state that fighting has been renewed in the vicinity of Retimo, in the island of Crete, and that the insurgents have been successful in their encounters with the Turkish troops. The latter are hard pressed, and have telegraphed to Canada for reinforcements.

THE PORTE MAY ISSUE PAPER MONEY. Constantinople, July 28.—It is rumored that the Turkish Government contemplates the issue of paper money.

A CONSERVATIVE CONCESSION. London, July 28.—The Westminster Gazette this afternoon says that during the debate on the Home Office vote on Friday next, the Home Secretary, Sir Matthew White Ridley, will probably announce the mitigation of the sentences of the Irish political prisoners.

JAMESON'S FATE. London, July 28.—The Westminster Gazette expresses the opinion that the jury is likely to convict Jameson and his companions. The speech of Sir Edward Clarke in Jameson's defense yesterday was commented upon as weak in the extreme. The Westminster Gazette says: "The oratorical references to the defender of women and children were absurd in view of the now well-established fact that the whole affair was a stock jobbery conspiracy. It is reported on good authority that Clarke himself only hopes for a disagreement of the jury."

THE VENEZUELAN TROUBLE. London, July 28.—In the House of Commons Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, replying to Mr. John Morley, who asked him whether the Government would lay on the table information relative to the limits and population of the settlements within the territory in dispute between Great Britain and Venezuela, said the definition of the settlements would have to be decided,

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
