The case was settled on a basis of an allowance to the defendant for having to engage new help for higher wages. The case may be appealed.

-Knox Church, South London, held an adjourned meeting of its congrega-tion last evening, to consider plans for extension of the seating accommodation of the church. It was found, on estimates submitted by the board of managers, that the cheapest plan that would meet the present wants of the congregation would cost not less than \$600, whereas the original estimate of \$3,000 would not only improve the ar-chitecture and conveniences of the church, but would provide ample accommodation for the future, as well as the present need of the congregation.

It was accordingly unanimously resolved that the board of managers be authorized to receive tenders for the extension and remodeling of the church as was originally proposed, and to proceed with the alterations at once, provided the work can be kept within the estimate. The plan provides for the construction of an alcove on the south side of the church, to contain an organ loft, choir gallery and pulpit platform in front. There are to be two porch entrances at either corner on Bruce street, and the seats are to face the pulpit in amphitheater form. When completed the improvements will transform the entire style of the church, converting its interior into a commodious structure. Rev. J. G. Stuart presided
