#### MUST BE TRIED FIRST

Judgment of Chief Justice Falconbridge and Justice Street Re the Sifton Will Case.

A dispatch from Toronto says: The Sifton will case must be tried before the criminal case is heard. That was the effect of the judgment of Chief Justice Falconbridge and Mr. Justice Street, who heard the appeal of the executors of the first will, who seek to have the second, the Morden will, declared a forgery. This judgment was given at the division court yesterday. The will left nearly the whole of the \$17,000 to Mary McFarlane, the affianced wife of the dead man, Joseph Sifton. The judgment reverses that of Mr. Justice Meredith, who, at the application of Edgar Morden, had postponed the hearing of the case. There is no

further right of appeal. In his judgment Chief Justice Falconbridge says: "Mr. Lount stated before the court that he was not appearing for the crown, and he declined to express the rown's intention or to undertake to offer the facts in connection with the making of the will in evidence as part of the case for the crown. All that he would say was that it would be proper for the crown to offer such evidence, and then it would be for prisoner's counsel to object or to allow it to go in. This is quite different from the position taken by him as understood by Mr. Justice Meredith, as expressed by him in his judgment. No offer or undertaking is made as to the allowance of substantive evidence on the part of the prisoner touching facts connected with the will. Nor is it suggested how a judge trying Gerald Sifton for murder could be bound by such arrangement. The appeal is althe facts in connection with the making Gerald Sifton for murder could be bound by such arrangement. The appeal is allowed without costs."

The judgment of Mr. Justice Street says: "The action was brought to set aside an alleged forged will drawn up by Edgar Morden, who claims it was witnessed by him and his wife, and who also states that Gerald Sifton told him before the will was drawn that he intended to kill his father, and how he intended to do it. Edgar Morden is, in fact, one of the principal witnesses for the crown upon the charge of murder against Gerald Sifton. The estate of the testator is valued at \$17,000 or \$18,000. The case before us resolves itself into this testator is valued at \$17,000 or \$18,000. The case before us resolves itself into this simple state of facts. A man who expects to be a crown witness upon an approaching trial for murder applies to the court to postpone the tril of a civil action against himself lest the disclosures of the judgment in the civil action should have the effect of discrediting him as a witness. I have been unable to find any precedent for such an application, and with great respect for the opinion of my brother Meredith, I am of opinion that the reasons given were not sufficient to justify the making of the order.
