TRACKS TO RUN ON BEACONSFIELD AVE.

**Plan Does Not Interfere With the Street
Traffic.**

The board of works held a short ses-
sion last night.
Manager Carr submitted a plan for
bringing the return cars from Spring-
bank by way of Beaconsfield avenue
down to Wortley road, there to connect
with York street. The scheme was op-
posed by a deputation of Beaconsfield
avenue residents, who thought that the
street was too narrow to lay a track on.
Manager Carr said that some of the
residents were in favor of the plan.

Ald. Jolly moved that the company
be allowed to lay their tracks, provided
there was sufficient room on each side
for traffic. Carried.
The request of Wm. Rodgers for dam-
ages received by falling on the Wel-
lington street sidewalk, was laid over
for a special meeting on Monday night.
The mayor moved that the engineer
be instructed to make up an area of
the streets on which snow-clearing
should be done. Carried.

A TEN-YEAR LEASE WITH A \$5,000 BONUS

The Conditions Under Which the Columbia
Handle Company Will Remain
in London.

Mr. John Stevely represented the
Columbia Handle Works at yesterday
afternoon's meeting of the manufac-
turers' committee. Mr. Stevely said
that he had information that a number
of other cities wanted the factory. He
was assured the G. T. R. would not
rebuild or repair the damaged build-
ings. He asked the city for a bonus of
\$3,000 to make repairs, and to endeavor
to extend the firm's term of exemption.
The mayor, while in favor, if possible,
of granting the company's request, did
not think the giving of a bonus was
practicable.

After some further discussion Mr.
Stevely proposed that the city should
give a \$5,000 bonus and exemption, pro-
vided the company could secure from
the Grand Trunk a ten-year lease of
the property.

The committee finally passed a reso-
lution advising the council to grant
the company's request. The mayor,
Ald. Stevely and Ald. Douglass
Mr. Leonard will go to Montreal to in-
terview the G. T. R. regarding the
desired lease extension.

PASSED AWAY AFTER LINGERING ILLNESS

**Mrs. Richard Lucas Died at St. Marys—
Members of Family Live in London.**

The St. Marys Journal contains the
following account of the death of Mrs.
Richard Lucas, mother of Messrs. Al-
bert and Richard Lucas, and Mrs.
Win. Reid, of this city:
"After a long and painful illness
Mrs. Richard Lucas passed away last
Saturday, March 8, at the family re-
sidence, Salina street. She had been
confined to her room for many months,
and although there was little hope for
her recovery at any time during her
illness, she bore her suffering with
great patience and cheerfulness. The
deceased lady's name was Elizabeth
Bristow. She was born in Lincolnshire,
England, 60 years ago. Along with her
husband and family she came to St.
Marys direct from the old country,
over a quarter of a century since. Be-
sides her husband she leaves a family
of five sons and five daughters to
mourn her loss. The sons are Albert
and Richard, London; George, Detroit,
Mich.; William, St. Marys, and John,
who is a member of Baden-Powell's
Cub Scouts' force in St. Marys. Africa.
The daughters are Mrs. Wm. Reid, of
London; Mrs. D. Kelly and Mrs. P.
Mitchell, St. Marys, and Misses Rose
and Agnes at home. The Mrs. Lucas
was an estimable woman, loved by a
family and held in high esteem by her
host of friends. She was a member of

vices being conducted by the Rev.

UNITE WITH THE DOMINION BODY.

Decision of London Retail Merchants
Association.

At a meeting of local retailers, held
last night in the Duffield block, under
the auspices of the London Retail
Merchants' Association, it was decided
that that body affiliate with the Retail
Merchants' Association of Canada. Mr.
Adam Ballantyne, president of the
Hamilton branch, and Mr. E. M. Trow-
ern, of Toronto, central secretary of
the Retail Merchants' Association of
Canada, addressed the gathering.

The former spoke of the advantages
of organization and the good that the
Retail Merchants' Association of Ham-
ilton had done, together with the ben-
efit it had worked in regard to trade.
Mr. Trowern explained the aims and
objects of the central association, and
urged action toward securing more re-
cognition from the Provincial and Do-
minion Legislatures. He spoke strong-
ly against the methods adopted by de-
partmental stores, also against the
system of trading stamps. He vigor-
ously advocated that corporations
should be made amenable to the law
as well as individuals. The officers of
the local branch and the visiting
speakers were appointed a committee
to draft a resolution of condolence to
be sent to Premier Ross. The local
branch starts out with a large and
representative membership.

WAS POSTMASTER FOR NEARLY FORTY YEARS

Death of Mr. George Kelly, of Lambeth, at
the Age of 76.

Mr. George Kelly, postmaster, of
Lambeth for over 35 years, and one of
the oldest and best known residents of
that place, died last night after a se-
vere illness from a complication of
diseases.

He was born in Ireland 76 years ago,
and lived at Lambeth about 1862,
where he conducted a general store and
the village postoffice, until last spring,
when his son took full charge of the
business. His widow and one son,
James Kelly, of Lambeth, are left to
mourn his loss. Mr. Andrew Kelly, of
Delaware, is a brother, and Mrs. Jones,
of Bothwell, is a sister of the deceased. He
was a member of the Church of Eng-
land.

The funeral will take place on Sun-
day.

Questions Answered.

M. C.—In what year was the present
court house built, and in what year
was the county jail built?
A.—The court house was built in
1827. In 1838 it was enlarged to about
twice its former size, making six tur-
rets instead of four. The present jail
was built about 60 years ago.

CAMLACHIE.—Your query is not
clearly stated and is written on both
sides of the paper, contrary to rules.
A farmer who ships or delivers on
board of the cars hay or other produce
consigned to a purchaser who agreed
to pay before delivery. The holder
cannot stop the goods unless the pur-
chaser has become insolvent. The
remedy is against the purchaser for
goods sold and delivered. The holder
of the bill of lading is entitled to the
goods, and if the bill of lading has
been assigned to the bank the original
purchaser can only sell the goods sub-
ject to the right of the bank to be
paid before giving up bill of lading.
The farmer can only look to the pur-
chaser for payment after he has ship-
ped the goods to him.
