PHONE LINES WERE DOWN
**Bell Company Suffers From the
Severe Storm.**

Wires to St. Thomas and Sarina
Were Snapped Monday Night.

The Bell Telephone Company knows
what it means to have a difference
with the weather man, as it has suf-
fered greatly from the effects of
storms this winter. At various times
the company's lines have been put out
of business by snow and sleet, but
the most serious of these misfortunes
occurred Monday night.

As a result of the storm which us-
hered March in like a whole menagerie
of lions, the company's lines west from
London to Sarina were completely de-
stroyed, and the connection with St.
Thomas was also cut off.

The company yesterday sent gangs
of men from all centers to the line
in repair, but the work was difficult
and slow, and it was not until last
night that a line was patched up in
working order to Sarina. About the
same time St. Thomas was connected
with this city by one line. St. Thomas
had been completely isolated from the
rest of the world as far as telephone
connection was concerned for 24 hours,
but today the wires are being rapidly
repaired.

The Bell Company officials in this
city say that by tonight normal con-
ditions will have been resumed on all
lines.

**Teachers' Purses Will
Now Be Better Filled**

**Board of Education Approves of
the Salary Increases.**

**Only a Small Percentage of the
Members Objected.**

Collegiate Institute Staff to Share
in the Good Things—Principals
Not "In It."

The salary question was settled by
the board of education at its regular
meeting last night. The gist of the
decision was that the maximum salaries
of Collegiate Institute teachers are in-
creased \$75 each; public school teachers'
salaries will range from \$300 to \$500,
and kindergarten assistants will re-
ceive from \$250 to \$300, instead of the
fixed salary of \$225, as heretofore. While
the discussion of details occupied con-
siderable time, the general principle of
increasing salaries was approved by all
save a small percentage of the mem-
bers.

The question was raised when
Trustee Yates presented the report of
committee No. 1, which was taken up
clause by clause. The first clause
simply recommended payment of ac-
counts amounting to \$229.82 and was
carried. Clause 2 recommended: "That
the minimum salary of teachers em-
ployed in the public schools be \$300
per annum, and that all teachers now
on the staff receiving less than that
amount be advanced thereto; that the
maximum salary be \$500, and that all
teachers below that sum receive an
annual increase of \$25 per annum till
\$500 is reached; that the foregoing scale
apply to the salaries of 1904."

Committee Chairman Yates moved
the adoption of the clause, seconded
by Trustee Fitzgerald. The former
claimed that things had changed in
the past fourteen years, and that the
cost of living had increased. Trustee
McLean interrupted that the cost of
living had not increased for single
people. Trustee Yates said many
school teachers, though single, had
children to support, and Trustee Bir-
twistle asked if the majority did. The
chairman thereat said that no speaker
was to be interrupted, and that he
would have order. Questions should
be asked through the chair. Trustee
McLean apologized.

When he had the floor, the latter
claimed that the cost of living had
been increased only for those who kept
house, and he disputed that the mil-
lions of school teachers were bread
winners.

Trustee Blackwell confuted that by
showing that people didn't calculate
a mechanic's salary by whether he
was married or single, and if parents
were well-to-do or not had nothing to
do with the question of a teacher's
salary. The clause carried, no hands
being raised when the yeas and nays
were called.

MADE SPLENDID SHOWING

**Annual Meetings of Two Westmin-
ster Presbyterian Churches.**

**Balances on Right Side—Services of
Pastor Appreciated.**

The First Presbyterian Church, Wil-
son Grove, of which Dr. McCrae is
pastor, held its annual meeting recent-
ly. The reports of the various branches
of the work for the year were of a
very encouraging character. The total
amount raised for missionary and
benevolent purposes by this section of
the Westminster parish was \$1,091—a
fine showing considering the fact that
some very liberal contributors have re-
cently removed from the district. In
the ordinary revenue there was a sur-
plus of \$383. The meeting voted that
\$50 of this be given to the pastor. On
Sunday Dr. McCrae thanked them for
their kindness to him. He had worked
hard to get them of his best, both in
the pulpit and out of it, and they had

shown their appreciation in their many
great kindnesses to him. The most
perfect harmony and goodwill have
prevailed throughout the year.

The annual meeting of St. Andrew's
Presbyterian Church, Glenora, which
is also under the pastorate of Dr. Mc-
Crae, was also held recently. The re-
ports showed a year of progress. The
amount raised for missions was be-
tween \$30 and \$40 more than last year.
There was a balance of over \$80 in the
repair fund, and in the ordinary
charge increase the pastor's stipend,
by \$50 a year. On Sunday Dr. McCrae
thanked his people for their kindly
generosity, which was in line with their
great kindness to him ever since he
came to Westminster. Altogether the
year has been one of delightful har-
mony and progress.
