

South Huron Liberals Make Splendid Choice

Mr. H. K. Kellerman the Unanimous Choice of a
Great Gathering for the Local Legislature—
Stirring Addresses by Leader and Others.

[From Our Own Reporter.]

Hensall, Oct. 10.—In one of the largest and most enthusiastic conventions ever held by South Huron Liberals, Mr. H. K. Kellerman, merchant, of Hensall, was today nominated to contest the south riding of Huron in the next general election for the Ontario Legislature. His was the only name submitted to the convention, and it was received with tremendous enthusiasm. Every sub-division of the riding was represented, and the utmost unanimity prevailed.

Sharply at 1 o'clock, the convention was called to order by the president, Mr. Harry Smith, of Exeter. On the platform with him were Mr. J. G. Stanbury, of Exeter, secretary of the association; Mr. G. McLean, Seaford; H. K. Kellerman, of Hensall; Alex. Mustard, Brucefield; Dr. Ferguson, Hensall; W. Murdoch, Brucefield; J. Murdoch, Brucefield; R. Gardner, Seaford; Charles Fritz, Zurich, and Mr. T. Fraser, Brucefield. After some routine business was transacted, nominations were called for, and the choice fell on Mr. Kellerman.

Only One Name.

Mr. Alex. Mustard, Brucefield, nominated Mr. H. K. Kellerman, of Hensall, as the Liberal candidate for the local Legislature. The nomination was seconded by Mr. Henry Doyle, of Seaford Township. No other name was put to the convention, and Mr. Kellerman was called upon for a speech.

Leader MacKay Speaks.

Hon. A. G. MacKay, leader of the Opposition, made his first appearance

on a convention platform since his acceptance of the leadership, and delivered a splendid address. For over an hour he held the audience in the closest attention. His speech was a very able one, and a scathing criticism of the Whitney Government. Mr. MacKay, as usual, made a great impression, and was warmly received. His remarks created great enthusiasm. He paid a glowing tribute to the candidate chosen, Mr. Kellerman, and expressed the opinion that Mr. Kellerman would redeem South Huron.

The Candidate.

Mr. H. K. Kellerman, the candidate, is a man of about 45 years of age, and is a farmer and merchant of Hensall. He is married and has a family. His father and mother immigrated to this country many years ago. They were pioneers of the township of Hensall. Mr. Kellerman has been very successful, and has made a splendid name for himself for honesty and uprightness. He is widely known over the riding, and has been in the township council for some years, and at present is deputy reeve of the township of Stephen. He is the strongest man in sight.

Resolutions of confidence in the Government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier were moved and seconded by Mr. D. D. Wilson, of Seaford, and Mr. Robert Gardner, of Farquhar. Resolutions congratulating Hon. Mr. MacKay on his appointment as leader of the Opposition were also passed.

A serious if not fatal accident was narrowly averted at the Rectory street crossing of the Grand Trunk late last night by the prompt action of a railroad employee who threw the derail and sent car No. 126, Ottawa avenue, off the track while the accommodation from the east bowled on down the yards about two feet ahead of the tender of the car.

The whole affair happened so quickly that the motorman had no time to reverse and in another second the car would have been on the track right in front of the train.

New York, Oct. 11.—A short-lived and futile attempt was made by the traders to bid the market up, but it was soon found that the offerings of stocks were large, and that they themselves were the principal buyers. The origin of the selling is, of course, difficult to determine, but undoubtedly a large proportion represents liquidation. As far as the situation abroad is concerned, there seems to be some little improvement in the selling for Amsterdam. There are rumors that certain pools are finding a difficulty in financing their commitments, and are therefore being obliged to liquidate. Sentiment continues pessimistic.
