SMART CHINESE CAPTIVE

Got Out of Honolulu Jail and Raised Money on Its Credit.

Honolulu, July 19.—Tin Soon, half-Chinese and half-Hawaiian, will be a captain of industry if he can keep out of jail. He escaped recently from the county jail here, but was caught when the steamer on which he embarked reached San Francisco.

After his escape he forged the signature of Deputy Warden Bourke to orders on local merchants for several bales of sugar bags and then sold these bags to Japanese merchants. With the money he paid his passage to San Francisco.

The forgery was discovered when Sheriff Henry asked a wholesale bag house why they had charged the territorial prison with \$80 worth of sugar bags. They replied that they had Bourke's orders for bags. Then Bourke was called in and pronounced the signature a forgery.

Tin Soon was soon found to be the one who had profited by the fraud. He was serving a year, sentenced for a misdemeanor, but had a ten-year sentence hanging over him. As he was a prisoner trusty his escape was easy.

He stole and sold a horse and buggy, realized on the sugar bag speculation and shipped on the steamer. He was all safe until the wireless got him.

Three recent examples which a

couple of years ago would have been regarded as aggravated lese majeste, earning long terms of imprisonment for the editors concerned, suffice to show the revolution that has taken place in German press conditions. The first case was a violent attack in the anti-semitic newspaper Hammer because the Kaiser persists in associating with wealthy Jewish merchants and bankers, particularly Herr Ballin, manager of the Hamburg-American Steamship Company; Herr Delbrück, a Berlin banker, and Herr Friedlander, a coal merchant. The Hammer declares that the ancient Prussian nobility will boycott the court unless the Kaiser refuses intimate friendship to Jews.

The second attack, which is made by the Welt am Montag, is of a kind peculiarly offensive to the Kaiser, being an imputation on his capacity for generalship. The paper quotes an article, in which Gen. Bunnell, of the French army, says: "If there should be war between France and Germany it would be the most fortunate thing in the world for us if the Kaiser chose to be his own general and conducted the operations himself."

The Königsberg Volkszeitung, finally, severely criticized the recent increase in the Kaiser's civil list, declaring that the fact that he had to provide for his sons was no reason for granting the increase.

NEARLY ALL THE TRADES ARE BUSY IN LONDON

Unskilled Labor Is Not in Such
Great Demand, Says the
Labor Gazette.

The last number of the Labor Gazette contains the following report from its London correspondent: Bricklayers and carpenters are all working. Lathers and plasterers are fairly well engaged. Painters are busy. Plumbers report trade fair. Iron molders and iron workers are very busy. Machine and repair work is good. Electrical workers and linemen are exceptionally busy. Carriage and wagon makers are busy. Car shops workers are busy on repair work. Coopers are very busy. Printers are exceptionally busy, and several firms are adding new machinery to cope with their increasing trade. Pressmen are very busy. Tailors are busy, as are also garment workers. Boot and shoe workers report trade good. Bakers and confectioners are busy. The leading cigar factories are closed owing to the strike. Tanners are exceptionally busy. Railroad train crews report more work than last month. Teamsters are busy. There is an over-supply of the unskilled class here, and a number out of work.

THIS MAN WROTE OWN DEATH NOTICE

His Wife Is in Canada and He
Wanted to Get Her
Back.

New York, July 19.—It is not every man who has the privilege of reading his own death notice written by himself. The distinction belongs to John H. Buttle, an insurance agent of Brooklyn. Yesterday in one of the morning newspapers there appeared the following: Buttle—Suddenly, July 14, 1910, John H. Buttle, 40 years old, of 259 Madison street, Brooklyn, died of pneumonia hereafter. Please omit funeral. Canadian papers please copy.

The notice was inserted by Buttle himself. Yesterday his friends who read it went around and said, "Poor John." Several persons who would have sent flowers to show their respect for his memory regretted his request that they refrain from so doing.

Buttle was dead as a mackerel to his friends until a call was made at the home of W. H. Buttle, father of the supposed dead man. There was no crepe on the door and no evidences of mourning. There were no showers of grief at the wooden house of W. H. Buttle in Manhattan.

Mr. Buttle was found last night. He was alive and not inclined to be communicative, but explained that his desire was to reach the eyes of his wife with the advertisement. She is in Canada, and has, according to the husband, been away six months on a visit to her sister, Mrs. George H. Ross, in Glenarry, N. W. T.

She had shown no inclination to return home, and Buttle believed if she heard he was dead, she would come back.

If he could fool her into returning under the belief that he was dead he was sure he could induce her to remain.

Just why Mrs. Buttle would return to a dead husband, when she would not come back to a live one, was not explained. Mr. Buttle admitted that his strategic plan of campaign had not been a great success, and he feared the Canadian newspapers might not "copy."

AFTER SUNKEN GOLD

Search for the Spanish Galleon in Tormery Bay Has Been Resumed.

London, July 19.—The search for the Spanish Armada galleon Florencia, which sank with treasure of fabulous amount in Tormery Bay in 1588, has been resumed.

This fresh venture is being undertaken by a London syndicate, which secured a lease from the Duke of Argyll in September last. Col. K. Mackenzie Foss, who has had extensive experience of submarine work in Ceylon, is superintending the actual operations.

The site under which the galleon lies will be bored by a mining expert and when anything resembling a hull has been located, native pearl divers from Ceylon will take up the investigations.

For at least two years inquiries of a historical character have been prosecuted in Spain and Italy as well as in this country, with the view of establishing the actual facts. As a result the situation of the wreck has been located to within a hundred square yards, and the problem correspondingly narrowed down.

Col. Foss has discovered that the Florencia was 120 feet in length, with forty feet beam, and carried fifty-two guns in addition to a very large sum in coin and bullion.

TIGHT MONEY.

Montreal, July 19.—The advance to 5½ per cent in the bank rate on call loans to the stock market made some time ago by three banks, has become general, and very little money can be secured at that rate. Most of the leading banks sent out their notices on Thursday and Friday.

GARONNE BREAKS BOUNDS.

Berne, Switzerland, July 18.—The Garonne River, which rises in the southeastern part of the Canton of Vaud and flows westerly into the Rhone, today broke its dykes for a distance of two miles.

LAYS HARD PAPERS TO HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS

A Public School Principal Says
They Were Arranged With
Object of Plucking.

Toronto, July 19.—Although complete returns have not yet been received, it is stated on good authority that of the 20,000 or more Ontario children who wrote on the entrance examination a few weeks ago less than half were successful. A few towns and cities made a creditable showing, but the majority of schools fell far below the average of former years.

Toronto passed 55 per cent of its candidates, Hamilton 52, Kingston 58, London 62, Galt 75, Preston 100, and Brantford 48 per cent, while in some

centres not a pupil succeeded in making the grade. In Bobcaygeon 23 candidates wrote and all failed.

A well-known member of the Ontario Educational Association was responsible for the statement today that this large percentage of failures was undoubtedly caused by the difficulty and general trickiness of the papers. "That arithmetic paper was not only mean and catchy," said another principal, "but I firmly believe it was set with the express intention of plucking candidates rather than testing their knowledge." The high school teachers want well-trained pupils, and it is to their interest to make the examination as rigid as possible, and we of the public schools have to bear the brunt of their unjust and misdirected control."
