always characterized the acts of Queen Victoria, and which was so infallibly followed by the other sovereigns, the Queen did "the right thing" in a perfectly spontaneous way. Prussia and Austria hastened to follow the example of the Queen, but the Czar absolutely declined, and only reluctantly consented to recognize Napoleon as the head of the new dynasty. Time soon brought its revengegs, for Napoleon stood by us in the Crimea, while Russia was humbled in the dust and lost 150,000 men. When the war was over, Russia laid herself out to smash up the Anglo-French alliance, and in this she failed miserably.-Pall Mall Gazette.
