PERMANENT COMMISSION ON THE WATERWAYS

And Ottawa Dispatch Says Mr. Geo. C. Gibbons, K. C., Is to Head It

Ottawa, May 26.—It is probable that the Government will very soon appoint a new international waterways committee, that is to say, the Canadian representatives to co-operate with American representatives in governing all questions of our international waterways. The appropriations have been made.

The appointment of these men permanently has already been provided for in the international waterways treaty. In a press dispatch, sent from Washington recently, it was announced that the American Government has made appropriations for the appointment of the American commissioners. It now remains only for the Government here to name its men.

It is very probable that the temporary commission, the chairman of which is Mr. G. C. Gibbons, K. C., will be made permanent. The new commission will have for its first big problem the question of damming the St. Lawrence River just above the Long Sault Rapids. It will report to the two Governments on the project.

RUTHERFORD RUMORS

Again Reported That Albertan Premier Is About to Resign.

Edmonton, May 26.—It is considered practically certain that Premier Rutherford will resign from the Alberta Government today. In fact, it is said his resignation is now in the hands of the Lieutenant-Governor, and Chief Justice Sifton may be called upon to form a government. This, it is said, he has consented to do, providing the great waterways contract is cancelled. It was this contract that caused Rutherford's downfall. The bonds of seven millions are now held in New York, Montreal and London.

No effort will be made to involve this bond issue in the Legislature, but the money on deposit in local banks, for which the bonds were sold, will be taken over by the Government. The road will be constructed as a Government-owned highway, and operated probably in connection with the C. P. R. or Grand Trunk.

There is a statement in circulation that a coalition government will be formed, and R. B. Bennett, leader of the Opposition, be given a cabinet portfolio.

GUELPH FOREIGNERS IN KNIFE AFFRAY

Italian Stabbed by a Fellow-Countryman Following a Quarrel.

Guelph, May 25.—More excitement was again caused in the Italian quarters of this city when George Carere was stabbed by a fellow-countryman. The events leading up to the affair are very meagre. Carere and a few other Italians were standing on Alice street, the chief foreign street of the city. While they were engaged in conversation Carere received a gash about seven inches long. The knife penetrated the lower side of the neck and ran up past the jaw on to the cheek, ending just beside the eye.

Carere was taken to the hospital, where he lies in a serious state. He will not tell who did the stabbing, nor will he state how it came about. He will not even tell who were with him at the time. The culprit has been searched for in every Italian house in the city, but has not been found. The wounded man is the one who was accused and acquitted on a charge of shooting with intent to kill Angelo Amario. From reports received this morning Carere has caused much trouble among his fellows since his acquittal. He has been the bully of the colony. It is thought that this was the cause of the stabbing affair.

SAYS JESUIT OATH SHOULD BE AMENDED

Until That Is Done Orange Master Sproule Would Keep Coronation Oath.

Brantford, May 26.—The 81st annual meeting of the Grand Orange Lodge, British America, opened at Victoria Hall, this city, at 2:30 yesterday afternoon, when delegates numbering 250 registered.

Dr. Sproule, grand master of the lodge, gave the following address:

Of the proposed Protestant platform he said: A subject which has been forced on my attention is the adoption of a platform whereby all lodges shall be governed both in political elections and at all times. At last provincial grand lodge meeting British Columbia adopted a platform for their guidance in future, and to which all are expected to live up. It seems to me that such authority, if exercised by provincial grand lodges generally, might lead to serious trouble and grave abuse through the diversity of platforms which might be adopted, and which would doubtless be in conflict one with another, and thereby cause dissensions. If a platform is adopted it should, in my judgment, be one laid down by the most worshipful grand lodge, and govern all members of the association and all lodges alike.

Speaking of the accession oath, he said: Until the Pope cancels the oaths taken by the Jesuits, he has no right to ask for a change in the oath of the sovereign of Britain. The Jesuit bishops are made to swear that they believe the Pope has the right to depose kings and governments. While this claim exists it is necessary that all who admit it shall be excluded from ascending the throne of the British Empire. In no other way can this be done so successfully as by retaining the accession oath in its present form. I trust that this grand lodge, before it adjourns, will place on record the sentiment of the Orange Association throughout the Dominion. Petition against amendment in the oath are being circulated.

SEYLER DID NOT KILL ADAMS GIRL

Atlantic City Man Acquitted of Crime On Ocean Pier.

May's Landing, N. J., May 26.—William Seyler last night was acquitted of the charge of killing Jane Adams on the million-dollar pier at Atlantic City last February. The jury was out more than five hours.

The feature of the closing day of the trial was the testimony of the prisoner himself, who occupied the witness stand all morning. His story was a complete denial of the charge of killing the girl.

PROTECTED NAME OF H. O. HAVEMEYER

Spitzer Tells Why He Perjured Himself During the Sugar Trust Trial.

New York, May 25.—Oliver Spitzer, former superintendent of the docks of the American Sugar Refining Company, in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, who recently was pardoned from the penitentiary by President Taft, explained today why he did not confess during the trial which ended last February with his being sentenced to two years at Atlanta. Such a confession, he declared on the stand today, would "have carried him to a cemetery." In other words, he would have implicated a dead man—Henry O. Havemeyer, late head of the sugar trust.

Spitzer was under cross-examination by the defence at the trial of Charles R. Heike, secretary-treasurer of the American Sugar Refining Company, who, with five subordinates, is charged with conspiracy to defraud the Government by underweighing sugar. He gave his direct testimony for the prosecution Monday. He repeated that he had made his confession, not with hope of pardon, but to ease his conscience, and added that after conviction his attorneys, now appearing for several of the defendants, had urged him to tell all he knew.

TARIFF TALK OFF UNTIL NEXT FALL

But the Government Will Make Arrangements for Reciprocal Trade With Belgium and Italy.

Ottawa, May 25.—A courteous reply has been sent to Washington by the Canadian Government in response to President Taft's invitation for the opening up of tariff negotiations between Canada and the United States looking to a mutual lowering of trade barriers between the two countries. While expressing willingness to enter into negotiations for better trade conditions, which should prove mutually advantageous to both countries, the Canadian Government points out that, owing to the engagements of the Prime Minister, Hon. Mr. Fielding and other members of the cabinet, who are absent from Ottawa during the greater part of the summer, there will be little opportunity for the Government here to take up the question in any active and detailed way until September next. It is, therefore, suggested that the matter be left in abeyance until then.

Meanwhile it is believed that the present gathering movement in the United States, looking to a lowering of the protective duties on many items entering into the cost of living to the general public, will operate to the advantage of Canada in any future tariff bargaining.

Meanwhile also it is probable that reciprocal trade arrangements will be made by Canada with Belgium and Italy. Negotiations to this end are now under way, in accordance with the announcement made in Parliament last session by Hon. Mr. Fielding. These two countries are in practically the same class as France with regard to Canadian trade. By the conclusion of the treaty with France last session the way is clear to negotiate similar favored-nation terms with them.

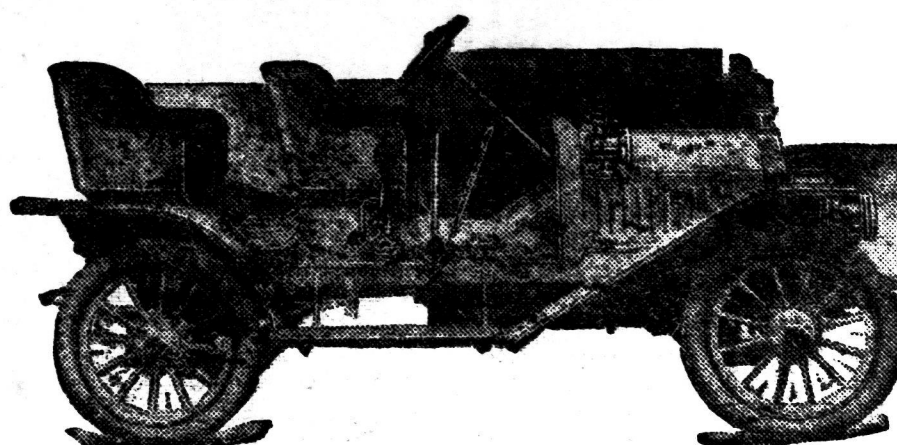

THE FUTURE OF SANDRINGHAM HOUSE

London, May 24.—Now that King Edward is no more it is highly probable that Sandringham House will fade out of the public notice as a royal residence almost as completely as did Osborne House, in the Isle of Wight, after the death of Queen Victoria. Sandringham House and estate, it may be recalled, were the personal property of the late King. The place is not a state residence.

In court circles it is an open secret that the new Queen is not very fond of Sandringham, and since Marlborough House became available for her as a residence she has not spent a great deal of time in Norfolk.

For one thing York Cottage, which is the present King's residence on the estate, is not a really commodious house, and it is hinted that Queen Mary's dislike of Sandringham had its origin in this lack of accommodation as their family grew, and was accentuated by the fact that York Cottage has no separate grounds. Sandringham will, in future, be associated most closely, it is thought, with the Queen-Mother, who will probably go into retirement there.

DERBY TO RACE THE KING'S HORSES

London, May 26.—It is announced that Lord Derby will take over the ownership of King George's races until the end of the year.

It was officially announced yesterday that King Edward bequeathed his racing stable and breeding stud to King George, and that the latter would carry them on as heretofore. There are 25 horses in training, and most of them were engaged until 1912, but the death of King Edward voided the en-
