## UNIONISTS FACE CALAMITY SAYS AUSTIN CHAMBERLAIN

Will Not Accept the Responsibility For Decision to Abandon  
Proposal to Place a Tax on Foods—Bonar  
Law Is Silent.

London, Jan. 13.—Austin Chamberlain announced at Birmingham tonight that he could not accept responsibility for the decision of the Unionists to abandon the proposal to impose taxes on food imported into the British Isles.

He could not "turn back," he said, on the cause he had championed, and while he would continue to support his leaders and his party, he feared that the

decision that party had taken would prove calamitous.

It was expected that Andrew Bonar Law, leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons, would announce today whether he would accept the memorial addressed to him by the Unionists advocating the policy of abandoning the food taxes at the next general election, but he has been in further consultation with Lord Lansdowne and other leaders, and has as yet given no indication of his intention.

## MOTHER FATALLY BURNED AND DAUGHTER MAY DIE

Aged Mrs. Foe Fell Backwards Going Upstairs and Knocked  
Lamp Out of Her Daughter's Hands—Sad  
Fatality at Strathroy.

Strathroy, Jan. 14.—Mrs. A. H. Foe is dead, and her daughter is in a very critical condition as a result of burns sustained at their store on Front street late last evening, when Mrs. Foe while going upstairs stumbled and fell backwards on her daughter, who was carrying a lighted lamp.

The women conducted a confectionery shop, and had just closed up for the night. Miss Foe had locked up, and was following her mother upstairs when the accident happened. Mrs. Foe was 80 years old, and when talking a step up her foot slipped, and she fell backwards. The lamp was knocked from her daughter's hand and fell and broke on the stairway, and in an instant the blazing oil had caught the clothes of the women.

Miss Foe, held helpless for a few moments against the side of the stair by her mother's weight, finally freed herself, and then fought desperately to smother the flames, neglecting herself entirely.

Finally her screams attracted the attention of Mr. Fred Gould, who was passing, and he called help, and then broke in the door, and carried Mrs. Foe and her daughter out. The older woman was horribly burned, and died at 6 o'clock this morning. Miss Foe

is suffering greatly, but has a good fighting chance.

The fire department soon had the fire in the house under control, and little harm was done. Dr. McCabe was sent for and did everything possible to relieve the intense pain of the victims.

The only relatives of Mrs. Foe reside in Hamilton. It is expected that her funeral will be held on Wednesday, Mr. Foe, husband of deceased, died several years ago.

### BAD FIRES IN WEST

Portage La Prairie, Man., Jan. 13.—St. Cuthbert's Roman Catholic Church was destroyed by fire last night. The loss is \$121,000.

Alton, Sask., Jan. 13.—A heavy loss by fire was sustained here when a bank, office, and several general stores and a real estate office were completely destroyed by fire with a loss of \$30,000.

## CANADIAN UNIVERSITIES TO HAVE DRILL HALLS

Government to Provide in Estimates For Buildings at McGill and Toronto Universities.

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—It is expected that the estimates, when brought down, will be found to include appropriations for drill halls in connection with the University of Toronto and McGill University. The erection of these halls will enable the universities to embark seriously upon the work of the officers' training corps, in which the Minister of Militia is deeply interested.

Much has been done in Great Britain through the officers' training corps to prepare young men who are attending institutions of learning to become leaders of the community in military as well as in civil matters. Students at universities are regarded as men fitted by their intelligence, spirit, and social position, to become officers in the citizen forces of the country, and accordingly such of these as volunteers are given training with the special purpose of qualifying them as officers.

The movement has assumed large proportions in the mother country, and is expected to do well in Canadian universities as well as in the United States, such as drill halls and armories, are provided.

Both McGill and Toronto authorities have shown much interest in the proposals. Principal Peterson was in the city today with regard to the matter, and members of the board of governors of Toronto University have recently been in communication with the minister.

## SUFFRAGETTES WRING CONCESSION FROM GOVT.

Ban Has Been Removed on  
Reception of Deputation  
in the Commons.

London, Jan. 13.—The British Government today reversed its ban placed on the reception of deputations of suffragettes, and agreed to welcome in the House of Commons today a body of working-women and the representatives of the Women's Social and Political Union next week.

Premier Asquith has deputed David Lloyd George to receive the women, and the chancellor of the exchequer probably will be accompanied by the secretary for foreign affairs, Sir Edward Grey.

Militant suffragettes claim that their threats of a revival of the riots in Parliament Square were responsible for the Government's change of heart.

## VICTIMS OF STORM CLOSE TO SHELTER

Mother Dead and Child Exhausted After Night in Far Western Blizzard.

Kamloops, Jan. 13.—Within one hundred yards of shelter, which could not be found owing to the terrific blizzard which raged, Mrs. Cornwall, wife of Capt. Cornwall of Rose Hill ranch, and her daughter, spent a terrible night in the snow. The mother perished of exposure, and the daughter crawled to Humphrey's homestead, near at hand, as soon as daylight broke. She is now in Kamloops hospital.

Mrs. Cornwall and the little girl started from Kamloops in a sleigh on Saturday evening for their home. They were caught in a blizzard, which so frightened their horses that they bolted and overturned the vehicle, leaving them in the snow.

## LIBERAL MEETING

North Wellington Association to Hold Rally at Arthur.

## 240,000 MASSACRED

This Number of Defenceless Turks Slain by the Allies.

Berlin, Tuesday, Jan. 14.—The Tagblatt prints a dispatch from Rome quoting an unnamed diplomatic representative of a great power in the Orient who in referring to the alleged outrages perpetrated upon the defenceless Turks of the Balkan States, says: "The number of those massacred is estimated at 240,000, and I consider that this number is not too high."

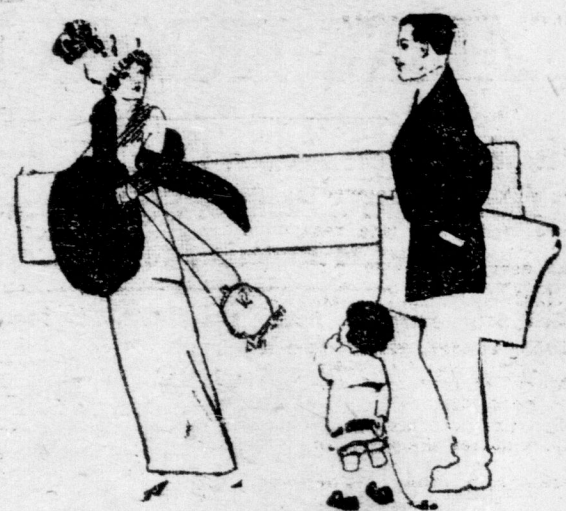

## CAN'T FIND LEGACY

Bank Ledgerkeeper was Found Guilty of Stealing \$35,000.

Montreal, Jan. 13.—Henri Legace, the former ledgerkeeper of the Bank of Hochelaga, who was recently found guilty of stealing \$35,000 from the bank by manipulating his books, is being diligently searched for by bailiffs but cannot be found. He was allowed out on bail while the appeal case was pending.

On Friday a city detective discovered \$14,000 of the missing money, and a caveat was then issued for Legace, but so far the bailiffs have not been able to find the former ledgerkeeper to serve it on him.

As the case now stands, Legace is entitled to remain out on bail until the appeal is decided, and if it goes against him he must appear for sentence. With the \$14,000 found, the money in the hands of the court practically squares the sum taken from the bank.

## BOBSLEIGH HIT POLE

Three Injured in Accident at a Toronto Slide.

Toronto, Jan. 14.—Three people were injured, one of them seriously, when a bobsleigh crashed into a hydro-electric pole at the Riverdale slides last evening about 9 o'clock. The victims are: Miss Victoria Williams, aged 15, 52 McCaul street; Roy Hancock, aged 17, 42 McCaul street, and Miss Hilda Padgett, aged 22, 74 Markham street. The first two were taken to the General Hospital, while Miss Padgett was taken to her home. Miss Williams is suffering from a compound fracture of the right thigh, a number of bruises, and probably internal injuries. Her condition is very serious. Miss Padgett is bruised about the body, and suffering greatly from shock, but the doctors could not tell her exact condition last night. Hancock had his ankle injured, but his condition gives no cause for alarm.

## BADLY BATTERED

Italian Was Pounded Over the Head With Big Club.

Guelph, Jan. 13.—The local police are trying to solve another fracas among foreigners. Primo Favero, an Italian, is today confined to his bed, and Joseph Damiano, who accompanied him, is also nursing some bruises, as the result of a row which occurred last night at the corner of Waterloo avenue and Edinburgh street. The first named is pretty badly battered up, and claims that he was pounded with a big wooden club over the head as he was walking along the street as peaceful as any citizen. He was knocked unconscious, but was picked up and carried home by Damiano, who also received some bruises while helping his friend.

A foreigner has been charged with committing the assault, but he says he knows nothing about a club being used.

## BAILED IN \$2,000

Young Man Held For Smuggling Chinamen at Windsor.

Detroit, Jan. 13.—Charles Rose, a Windsor young man, pleaded not guilty when arraigned before United States Commissioner Hurd today charged with attempting to smuggle a Chinaman into the United States. He was admitted to \$2,000 bail and his hearing set for Jan. 20.

## ROSTRON'S PERIL

Captain Who Rescued Titanic Survivors Near Death on Caronia.

New York, N. Y., Jan. 13.—Captain Arthur S. Rostron, of the Cunarder Carpathia, who brought to port the survivors of the Titanic disaster last April, narrowly escaped serious injury aboard the Caronia last Thursday, according to officers of the vessel, which reached here today. Captain Rostron, now in command of the Caronia, was on the bridge, when he heard a crash. Looking aft he saw a long-boat bearing directly at him on the crest of a giant wave. He ducked, and was drenched, but the boat passed over his head and was splintered on the deck. Captain Rostron said the Caronia's trip across the Atlantic was the most stormy and perilous in his career.
