Necessity of Permit Reduces
Number of Rabbits on
Market.

Although the present is the "game"
season in more than one sense of the
word, there has been no large offering
of rabbits on the local market. Because
of the fact that a permit is necessary,
the quantity shot has been reduced to a mini-
mum, and in consequence the offering is
small, at 50 cents per pair.
Residents of the surrounding country
report an abundance of game that has
not been experienced for many years.
"The woods seem full of rabbits and
squirrels," one farmer told The Advertiser
this morning. "Even along the roads
skirting the brushy country they frequently
dart in front of the horse, sometimes
frightening the animal by the suddenness
with which they run past."

**DEAD MAN'S STOMACH
WILL BE ANALYZED**

An Inquest Opened Today Into
the Death of Percy
McRoberts.

Coroner Dr. A. V. Becher this morning
opened an inquest into the death of Percy
McRoberts, an employee of the hydro-
electric commission, who died suddenly
at the residence of Mr. Samuel Clarke, 322
Wellington street, Wednesday morning.
McRoberts went into Mr. Clarke's resi-
dence on Tuesday evening, having been
taken sick on the way home, and a friend
of his who lived there put him to bed.
In the morning it was found that he was
seriously ill, and Dr. Jenson was summon-
ed, but the man died before his arrival.
It was at first decided that an inquest
was unnecessary, but after consultation
with Crown Attorney McKillop, Dr. Becher
decided that, owing to the fact that the
man died away from home, and evidently
from the effects of something he had
taken into his stomach, an inquest would
be desirable to clear up the actual cause
of death.
The stomach of the dead man has been
sent to Toronto for analysis.
The jury viewed the body at Smith, Son
& Clarke's undertaking parlors at noon
today, and the inquest was then adjourned
to Wednesday, Dec. 3, at 8 o'clock in
the evening, at the police station.

**SPEAKERS PRAISE
EARLY CLOSING AT
GROCERS' DINNER**

Annual Banquet Finds Them
Unanimous for Shorter
Hours.

CO-OPERATION IS URGED

Out of Town Grocers Offer
Congratulatory to Local
Organization.

At an enthusiastic banquet held last
evening by the London Retail Gro-
cers' Association in the City Hotel the
speakers were unanimous with the as-
sertion that the early-closing move-
ment would in future have their un-
divided support until conditions which
at present cause the grocer and his
helpers to labor through half of the
night would be rectified.
Vigorous applause followed each
emphatic assertion in favor of the
popular movement. The general feel-
ing was that the citizens were will-
ing to co-operate with the grocers,
and that only the efforts of the latter
were required to carry the movement
through.

Grocers' Banquet

At least 150 guests sat down to the
tasty spread, and altogether it was
without doubt the most successful ever
held since the inaugural banquet six
years ago at which a record atten-
dance marked the inception of a move-
ment that has since become city-wide
in its popularity.
The menu was all that might be de-
sired, and was in keeping with the
usual excellent functions of the retail
grocers.

Harry Ranahan, president of the
local organization, presided over the
toast list. Replying to the toast, "The
King," Mr. Ranahan paid a tribute to
the work of the association. In refer-
ence to the early closing he was un-
animously agreed that it was being
largely signed, and was meeting with
unanimous favor with the exception of
a few of the smaller grocers in the
suburbs. Organization was the only
method of obtaining their just dues,
he declared.

Col. A. M. Smith responded to the
toast of "Canada," stating that Cana-
dians were realizing more with each
succeeding day their opportunities and
the greatness of their country. Canada
was the place for optimism, he asserted.
The peace and tranquility of the
nation should be kept with the

**SMALL ATTENDANCE AT
LUCAN STOCK JUDGING**

Interesting and Instructive Lec-
tures, However, Featured
Convention

The Lucan stock and seed judging
convention held at Lucan Monday and
Tuesday, and arranged for by the
Farmers' Institute and the district rep-
resentative, I. B. Whale, B. S. A., was
rather poorly attended, due largely to
the farmers being anxious to complete
the fall work and a sale of stock held
the afternoon of Tuesday kept many
from attending. On Monday afternoon
Mr. John Gardhouse gave a very in-
teresting and instructive talk on breed-
type and conformation, demonstrating
the points by animals in the tent. Mr.
John Gibson, of Denfield, the noted
shorthorn breeder, and Mr. McLean
of Lucan, supplied the cattle.

The evening meeting, addressed by
Mr. Gardhouse and Mrs. Dawson, was
well attended, both delivering inter-
esting and instructive addresses. The
music by Mr. O'Shea was much ap-
preciated.

Tuesday morning the seed question
was taken up. While the audience
was not large, the discussions were in-
teresting. Mr. J. W. Noble, of the
County Department of Agriculture, ex-
plained the seed control act, and out-
lined methods of eradicating the most
troublesome weeds.

In the afternoon sheep and horses
were up for discussion. Mr. Gibson
supplied some fine Lincoln ewes for
the judging. The horses were sup-
plied by Mr. K. Hodgins and Mr. Jas.
Coursey.

**OUTLINES DUTIES OF
CONSULAR SERVICE**

J. Boyce-Broderick Tells the
Women's Canadian Club of
Objects of Consul's
Life.

Some of the duties connected with
the consular service, and how a consul
may be of service in promoting inter-
national commerce, formed the basis
of an excellent address given by Mr. J.
Boyce-Broderick, of the British con-
sular service, before members of the
Women's Canadian Club yesterday af-
ternoon.

Mr. Boyce-Broderick traced the ap-
pointing of consuls from an early pe-
riod in the world's history. The ancient
Greeks and Egyptians, he said, had
men set apart to act as arbitrators in
commercial disputes. In England the
first consul was appointed in 1485. He
was an Italian, and the document ap-
pointing him was still preserved in
the archives of the foreign office. One
interesting phrase contained in the ap-
pointment was that which entitled the
consul to a commission on all com-
mercial transactions which he fur-
thered for the benefit of Britain. Un-
fortunately for the consul this com-
mission has long been long away with.
Mr. Boyce-Broderick said, smilingly.
There were, however, some compensa-
tions. A consul was exempt from pay-
ing taxes; was not required to
enter military service; did not have to
appear as a witness, and could not be
arrested.

Protection for Girls.

Describing some of the many duties
which the consular service involves,
Mr. Boyce-Broderick said that one
thing all British consuls were glad to
do was to look after foreign girls com-
ing into a country without assurance
of employment, or without knowing
whether promised employment was
quite legitimate. During his term as
consul in New York Mr. Boyce-Broder-
ick said he had had some experience
along this line, and in one case in par-
ticular, which he described, was able
to save a girl from falling into the
hands of undesirable characters.
"A consul is keenly alert to find
new outlets, and a market for the sur-
plus products of the country he rep-
resents. When Canada has to take
her place beside other countries long
established in trading and commerce,
it would be of great advantage to her
if a British consular service was es-
tablished in the Dominion," said the
speaker. He predicted a great future
for Canada. "Canada is the nation of
the twentieth century. That implies
not only an advantage, but responsi-
bilities as well. She must contribute
her own Canadian achievement to the
deeds of men. No individual or nation
ever attained to greatness by copying
another." Mr. Boyce-Broderick be-
lieved, however, that Canada could
avoid mistakes by studying the com-
mercial history of the United States.
Information Always Ready.
"Wherever a British subject stands
in need of information of any kind, the
consul is ready to secure it for him,
or have others in authority to do so,"
said the speaker in conclusion.
