BODY OF YOUNGER MASTERSON CHILD FOUND IN MORNING

Swimmers Find Second Victim of Drowning Fatality.

NEIGHBORHOOD SADDENED

Funeral of Chelsea Green Boys Will Be Held on Monday.

John and Edward Masterston, aged 7 and 4 years, sons of Edward Masterston, of 49 Ada street, were drowned at the Claybanks, opposite the Chelsea Green swimming pool in the south branch of the River Thames, last evening about 9:30.

The little fellows, the only boys in the Masterston family, were raised close to the river, and were accustomed to spend a great deal of their time in the water. They were last seen together on the bank of the river, near the swimming pool, at about 9:30.

A Dangerous Spot. At this point in the river, the Claybanks, long known to Londoners as one of the most dreaded spots in the water for several feet, the surface of the water is very shallow, and the bottom is composed of mud and stones. The water is not deep, but the slippery clay at the bottom makes the stream beyond are slime and which will hold anything which catches them, and deep holes to trap the unwary bather. On the opposite side of the river, in which thousands bathe every year, is a perfect safety.

According to the story told by Robert Masterston, about 9:30 a 4-year-old child slipped off the projecting shelf into the deep water. His brother, John, 7 years old, pulled his hand and attempted to grasp him out, and in the struggle John was pulled in, and both boys perished.

Gave the Alarm. Robert hurried to the boys' home as soon as he saw them disappear, and gave the alarm. The pulmotor was "phoned" for, and two boys, Bruce Wells, of 1200 Florence street, and Jack Parks, who were dressing in the bathhouse, immediately put on bathing-suits and dived for the bodies. At 5:50, after searching twenty minutes, the body of John Masterston was found by Wells at a point a few feet below where the drowning occurred.

The little fellow was carried up to his home, where Fire Chief John Aitken was ready with the pulmotor. For fifteen minutes Chief Aitken, Nursing Sister Mrs. Swindell, of the St. John Ambulance Corps, who lives in that district, Walter Edmanore, a Red Cross worker, and two neighbors, Mr. Crossley and Reeves, worked over the boys. For thirty minutes artificial respiration was tried, but without success. He had been in the water along twenty minutes when found, which was too long to give the pulmotor a chance to have any effect.

Cries of Anguish. The entire family are prostrated with grief, and the cries and lamentations could be heard all over Chelsea Green. News of the fatality spread quickly through the district, and fathers and mothers hurried to the scene fearing that it was one of their sons who had been drowned, as practically all of the Chelsea Green children are in the habit of playing along the claybanks.

Today the widows of Chelsea Green are saddened by the affair. Edward Masterston, father of the boys, with his two daughters, Bessie and Kathleen, were at the station saying farewell to his brother, who was leaving London with the 142nd Battalion, and had just arrived home when the accident occurred.

During the night firemen and willing workers from the south end searched the river with grappling irons for the bodies of the little fellows. Young men dived into the water and swam along the bottom examining the holes for the body. All night long they labored, and this morning at 6:30 it was located at the chimney in the bend of the river near McCleary's factory by John and Ben Noble, two of the finest swimmers in Chelsea Green.

Coroner Dr. A. Maclearen was called and took charge of the case. No inquest will be held, death being purely accidental.

Besides their father and mother, the little fellows are survived by three sisters, Bessie, May and Kathleen. The funeral of both boys will be held from the family residence, 49 Ada street, on Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. J. H. Boyd will conduct the services, and interment will take place at Woodland cemetery.

A sad feature of the affair lies in the fact that the parents possess no pictures whatever of the little fellows, and had arranged to have some photographs taken today. When reporters called asking for pictures a search was made high and low through the house, but without success; not even a snapshot of them could be found with the remaining members of the family might refreshen their memory of the ones which they are lost.

AGREEMENT WITH CITY OF WINDSOR STICKS; LONDON'S?

While London's Goes Into Disarray, However.

241ST NOT COMING IN

Scrap of Paper With Border City Will Be Adhered To, Says D. O. C.

An impression which appears to have been created in some quarters that the 241st (King's) Battalion would be moved to London as soon as possible to complete a brigade, is without foundation. Col. L. W. Shannon, D. O. C., stated today that he had made a definite agreement with the city of Windsor and the officers of the unit to the effect that it should remain there until its preliminary training was completed. Its movements after that depend on the orders of Sir Sam Hughes. The agreement was ratified by Ottawa, and unless the authorities there change their minds, the 241st will remain in Windsor for some months.

110TH BATTALION MEN ALL OFF HOME TO REGISTER VOTES

Will Take Part in Perth Bye-Election.

SOME CAMPS DESERTED

At Others All Is Bustle of Preparation for Departure.

Carling Camp presents scenes today that vary from the quiet of the graveyard to the semi-chaos of a battlefield in the midst of an unexpected move. Not a sound is to be heard in the lines of the 110th Battalion. The men left last night almost as a unit to register their votes in the Perth bye-election.

In the lines of the 110th "business as usual" is the slogan. While the usual number of men are always on leave, the balance of the unit, now freed of the possibility of a move, is "carrying on."

118th Lines Clear. The 118th worked for three hours last night, and at 1 o'clock all its extra impediments lay at the C. P. R. station in readiness for transit. This morning, however, over, orders were given for the striking of the 118th. The men left an hour not a stitch of canvas was visible. Each tent was packed in its bag and the station shortly after the cook-houses stand.

So many of the 118th are away on leave that the camp is a striking camp proceeds somewhat more slowly, but by 3 o'clock the men had reported clean up. Half of the whole height of camp is as bare as when Sir Sam first conceived the idea of sending men to London for a short visit.

An interesting sidelight on troop movements was witnessed this morning when the officers of the 135th Battalion were called into the orderly room and asked to sign a declaration to the effect that they were leaving no baggage or heavy debts behind them. It is stated that it was found necessary to enforce this order some months ago, as some of the officers of the earlier battalions were found to have left cities of Canada with large amounts of unpaid bills in the hands of the merchants.

Keeping Up Work. In spite of the general excitement prevailing over the departure of the troops for Camp Borden, the 160th Battalion keeps steadily on with its drill. The stretcher-bearer and signalling sections offer probably the most interesting spectacles. Some of the signalling is done from the roof and walls of a brick yard near the camp. Although from a distance the figures of the men are almost indistinguishable, the motions made with the blue and white flags show up clearly for a great distance, and demonstrate the usefulness of flag-signalling.

The stretcher-bearer section is practicing advancing under fire. To advance under a heavy fire, even without any ammunition, is a difficult task, but the stretcher-bearer section must advance at intervals, finding cover not only for itself, but for the stretcher-bearers. The stretcher-bearers are being taught. The administration of artificial respiration for men suffering from gas attacks and suffocation is one of the first lessons in first aid, and is divided in pairs. One section takes the places of the patients and the others carry on the work. From time to time the exchange is made.

Only Fatigue Party. Only fatigue parties remain on the camp grounds of "London's Own." A small fatigue party of 100 men, divided in pairs, are clearing up the grounds, and plumbers are turning off the water and removing plumbing fixtures.

The 110th Battalion has nearly all its tents down and equipment packed. Last night the men slept in the open and in the large mess tents. In first aid and in the north on the same grounds, has many of its tents standing yet. The 15th (Lambton) Battalion lies between the latter two battalions, and its tents are down, or the equipment are not packed yet. The battalions at Francis Camp, 168th and 186th, who were the last to receive orders for a move, have done much work in a short time, but many of the tents are still standing.

ANOTHER LONDONER WOUNDED.—Word has been received by Nathaniel Tate, 1023 King street, that his son, Ernest, 50077, Sapper, 1st Battalion, of the Canadian Engineers, has been admitted to the First Eastern General Hospital, Cambridge, Eng., suffering from a wound received in the forehead on July 2.

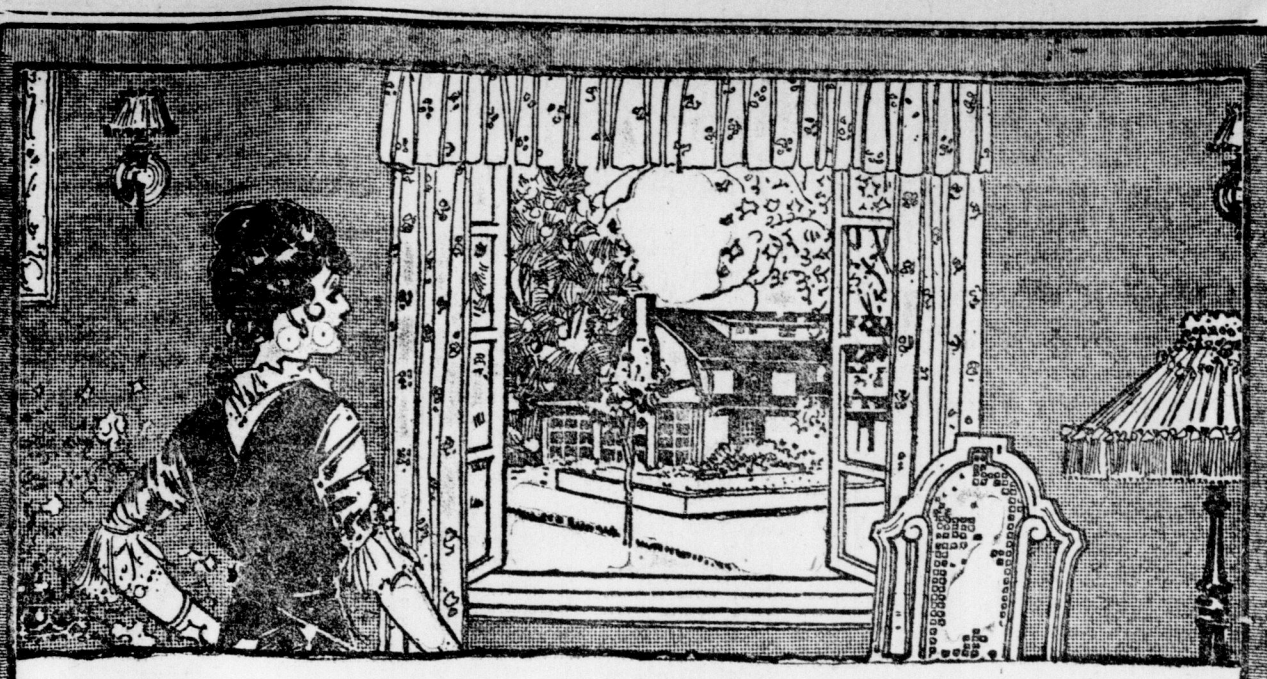

Women of London To Provide Comforts For Boys at Borden

Central Organization Suggested and Meets With Hearty Indorsement From Those Who Have Done Such Good Patriotic Work in City Already.

Less than 200 miles from London, Camp Borden will not be so far removed from this city that a constant supply of toothsome reminders of home cannot reach the battalions from friends and relatives in this district.

It is the time of fresh fruits and the season all the home-cooked "goodies" that have been the delight of London and Western Ontario men since they danced with delight at the thoughts of huckle-berry pie.

The Advertiser today suggested to a number of leading London women that an organization embracing all Western Ontario to provide edible "comforts" for the men who are at Borden should be considered at once.

"It isn't creditable," said one of the women, "but I have seen the 142nd Battalion go away lacking anything in the way of food. I am going to see what can be done in regard to some steps towards securing a field kitchen for the unit as soon as possible."

Mrs. H. M. Graham, secretary of the Municipal Chapter, considers the plan an excellent one. "I feel sure the county women will co-operate most heartily," she declared, "when it comes to sending cookery, fruit and such comforts. The London women are always ready to do their part."

"I gave some assistance to the women's auxiliary of the 142nd Battalion in asking members of the I. O. E. for lunches for the men of the unit who were going away. With the exception of one refusal, I have a most cordial response from everyone."

Personally in sympathy. Mrs. Donald McLean, president of the Women's Canadian Club, expressed herself as personally in sympathy with the idea. "Before I could speak for the club," she said, "I would have to consult the members. But I have no doubt that many at least would be willing to help. For one reason, many of our members have a personal interest in the men. They have husbands, sons, brothers, nephews or other relatives, if not with the 142nd or 15th, at least with some of the units which will be stationed at Camp Borden."

Mrs. A. T. Edwards, treasurer of the Women's Canadian Club, expressed herself as most interested, and immediately began to think about what the men would like. One thing, she felt sure, should be added to the edible comforts, literature.

Mrs. A. G. Calder, president of the women's auxiliary of the 142nd Battalion, and wife of Major Calder, third in command, was naturally interested. As far as the 142nd Battalion was concerned, however, she had a suggestion for the women.

Help With Sock Shower.—"The 142nd has an excellent canteen of its own," she said, "but there is something I would be so glad to have you mention in your paper. The women's auxiliary, which originally included only the officers' wives, undertook to provide the men with socks. Owing to the magnitude of the work it was decided to enlarge the auxiliary to include the wives and other near women relatives of the privates. We purposed raising funds to buy the wool with the assistance of the battalion band. Our first effort in this direction was the garden party of a few days ago. Now that the band is gone with the battalion, we have lost our chief source of revenue. We have been wondering if the women of London would help us with a sock shower."
