

URGE PROBE OF FREIGHT RATES

Deputation of Millers Leaves Kitchener To Wait On Premier.

Allege That Provincial Flour Is Being Discriminated Against.

KITCHENER, Oct. 30.—A deputation of Waterloo county millers, accompanied by W. D. Euler, M.P., left the city this evening en route for Ottawa where they will join a large deputation of Ontario millers which will wait on Premier King for the purpose of calling to his attention alleged unfair freight rates against Ontario flour. The millers allege that provincial flour is being discriminated against in favor of Western flour, as far as freight rates are concerned.

At an early hour this morning the hardware store of M. Weibel & Son of Waterloo was entered and two guns with a number of packages of shells taken. Entrance was gained by means of a trap door at the rear of the store. Judging from the manner in which the entrance was effected, the job was done by parties familiar with the surroundings. The police have been notified and are conducting an investigation.

Word was received here this morning from the provincial secretary of the reappointment of the mother's allowance board of Kitchener. The officers, reappointed are: Mrs. J. Kaufman, Mrs. Charles Massey, Robert Smyth, John Lang and A. R. Goudie.

The city treasurer announced today that 400 dog owners in Kitchener had paid licenses today, netting the city treasurer the sum of \$1,500. He estimated that about 100 more fees remain unpaid.

SAVES INDIAN FROM BEING WHIRLED DOWN RAPIDS

Chatham Youth Asks To Be Confined In Penitentiary Instead of Reformatory

CHATHAM, Oct. 30.—It is something unusual for a prisoner to ask for a term in Kingston Penitentiary instead of a term at the Ontario Reformatory, but that is exactly what George Plonkey did when arraigned in the county police court this morning on a charge of stealing chickens.

The defendant has a bad record, having appeared in court on several occasions. Magistrate Arnold first imposed a sentence of six months in the Ontario Reformatory, remark-

ing that he did not want to send him to Kingston.

Plonkey replied, "You may just as well make it two years and send me to Kingston. I shall get away from the reformatory if I have a chance."

Crown Attorney Smith immediately asked the court to sentence Plonkey to five years in Kingston Penitentiary, citing several cases where Plonkey had been the principal figure.

Magistrate Arnold thereupon imposed a sentence of three years in the Kingston Penitentiary.

Plonkey is only 19 years of age.

BICE MAY ENTER ELECTION CONTEST

Supporters Urge Trustee to Again Run For Office.

While School Trustee Rev. A. A. Bice, chairman of the public school committee of the board of education, has repeatedly declared that he will not seek re-election in December, it is known that many of his supporters in southeast London are urging him to re-consider his decision.

Trustee A. N. Udy, chairman of No. 1 committee, is another member of the board whose two-year term expires this month. Questioned upon this point, Trustee Udy stated that he has not arrived at any conclusion at this moment.

Should he decide to stand for re-election and be returned, Trustee Udy would be slated for the chairmanship of the board, it is explained in educational circles.

A lively tussle for school board honors is promised for Dec. 4. There are many new faces around the table next year and a formidable list of prospective candidates for office has been prepared.

As an instance, the labor element gives assurance that several suitable candidates will be nominated for the contest, while it is known that certain citizens who have been unsuccessful at previous elections will again be in the field.

EXPECT IMPROVEMENTS WILL BE MADE AT PORT

St. Thomas, Oct. 29.—Recommendations for greater appropriations for the Port Stanley harbor are hoped for as a result of the visit to the port Saturday morning of W. G. Raymond, M.L.A. for Brantford.

Discussing harbor improvements in general, Mr. Raymond stated that he did not think that enough attention had been paid to such public work in the past. He emphasized the importance of the Port Stanley harbor to Western Ontario.

It was pointed out to Mr. Raymond by members of the Chamber of Commerce that instead of an appropriation of \$10,000, the government should set aside \$100,000 for Port Stanley and enable the repairs and enlargements, planned several years ago, to be made.

PAISLEY MAY CONSTRUCT OWN GENERATING PLANT

Paisley, Ont., Oct. 29.—Paisley ratepayers, becoming tired of waiting for the hydro commission to erect the proposed hydro transmission line from Chesley to Paisley, which work was authorized by an almost unanimous vote last summer, are now considering the construction of a generating plant of their own on the Little Saugeen River about a mile from the village. Engineer James of Walkerton has been engaged by the council to take the necessary levels and prepare estimates as to the power available and the probable cost. Should the scheme prove feasible and the cost of power be less than that supplied by the hydro commission, the new dam and generating plant will likely be constructed next summer.

FIRST ST. ANDREW'S CONCERT SUCCESS

Madame Fahey Wins Great Praise From Large Audience.

In tribute to the season's first service of praise, St. Andrew's Church was practically crowded Monday night with an audience eager to hear the commencement of a series similar to that which proved so successful last winter.

With Charles E. Wheeler at the organ, St. Andrew's Church choir in full force, with its splendid soloists, and Madame Winnifred Lugin in solo numbers, the program fell short not one whit of an artistically finished and completely enjoyable performance.

Madame Fahey was not making her initial bow to London. She has been heard in the city before, and her audience held a grateful memory of the power and charm of her voice.

Her numbers were chosen with pleasing consideration, and in deference to a request proffered here, Madame Fahey finished with a brilliant rendering of "Rule Britannia," bringing the audience to its feet with her first ringing note.

Although the program bore the notice "Kindly refrain from applause," many hands sounded an involuntary tribute as the last note died.

Mr. Wheeler's numbers were most happily chosen. The organ of St. Andrew's Church, with its chiming and its harp stop, is recognized as a magnificent instrument, and under Mr. Wheeler's sympathetic touch, it responded in exquisite harmony.

The harp stop was first used in the third movement "Sunset," from a number by Demarest, and the effect was surprisingly lovely.

Mr. Wheeler played the choral prelude on "Christe, Redemptor, Omnipotens," by Parry, "Ave Maria," based on the first prelude of the "Well-Tempered Clavier" of J. S. Bach and Hollins' "Benediction Nuptiale," each selection a thing of beauty, rendered in most finished and sympathetic style.

"He Giveth His Beloved Sleep," in which Luta Laymon-Durst was heard with an accompanying chorus, was one of the evening's loveliest and most impressive numbers. Pleading also was "Will Magnifico, O God," with Miss Ulah Kennedy, Mrs. Durst, A. L. Christiani and E. A. Webster.

The choral numbers were exceptional in their finished perfection and the stirring interpretation caught from the conductor, Mr. Wheeler.

The opening number was "Ring Out Wild Bells," by Fletcher, and later in the program there was a group of three choruses, "Comes There a Stillness," "The Angelus," by Chamade, and "Go Not Far From Me," by Zingales.

Madame Fahey sang first the aria, "Hear Ye, Israel," from the "Elijah." The sombre, somewhat haunting, Rachmaninoff, "O Thou Billowy Harvest Field" was her next choice and one particularly impressive.

"Homings," by Will Magnifico, was a delightful number in which Madame Fahey's voice seemed to take on added richness and lilting melodious quality.

The program was completely a success, and augurs well for coming musical services which the audiences are to expect.

DEATH CLAIMS ONE IN DIPHTHERIA OUTBREAK

TOBERMORY, Oct. 30.—Diphtheria has broken out at Tobermory. Several cases have developed, and one death is reported this week.

Dr. Murray Fraser of the provincial board of health, and Dr. Wigle of Warton, visited the "Tub" on Tuesday and secured swabs from the throats of many residents of the village in an effort to locate any "carriers" of the disease. The children are also being inoculated. The disease has not reached an epidemic stage.

ENGLISH MINERS ARRIVE FOR NEW ONTARIO MINES

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—One hundred and twenty miners from Cornwall arrived on the Cunard liner Andania today, and will go to Northern Ontario, where they are to work in the gold and silver mines.

SIR GEORGE RHODES WEDS.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Mrs. Diana Morgan Hill, widow of H. Morgan Hill of Washington, D.C., was married to Sir George Rhodes at noon today in St. Mary's Catholic Church. Sir George and his bride, after a honeymoon in Scotland, will make their home in London.

Sir George Rhodes, who is 60 years old, is the father-in-law of Ian MacPherson, who was minister of pensions in the Lloyd George cabinet.

York County Grand Jury Recommends Heavier Penalties For Drug Addicts

TORONTO, Oct. 30.—The grand jury in the assizes, in their presentment this afternoon to Mr. Justice Riddell, recommended that drug addicts receive more severe sentences, and that the drug peddler receive the limit of the law.

"They are a menace to society," said the jurors. They also recommended that the jail farm be put under a board of commissioners, as they find that under "dual control" the institution is not operated in its best interests. A record of all prisoners to be sent along with their convictions is recommended, and also praise the educational system in vogue at the farm.

The Toronto jail was found to be obsolete by the grand jury, who recommended it should be remodelled or a new building erected more conveniently situated to the courts.

The Victoria Industrial Home for Boys was declared in need of painting, and it is recommended that the government increase their grant to this institution, "so that it can be carried on to better advantage."

There were 600 patients found in the Hospital for Insane at Mimico.

TURKS ACCEPT ALLIED PLAN

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 30.—Hamid Bey, the Nationalist representative in Constantinople, late tonight received a note from the Ankara Government for presentation to all allied high commissioners, accepting the invitation for the allies for the peace conference at Lausanne.

PLAN DRIVE TO PUSH WATERWAYS PROJECT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(By Canadian Press).—Advocates in Congress of the St. Lawrence Waterway scheme are reported to be planning a drive for the project by way of legislation. Efforts to amend the subsidy measure or to amend the proposed railroad legislation may be made. Most leaders in Congress, and the administration, however, see no prospect of getting anywhere until a treaty has been made with Canada covering the project.

Reports persist here that the Canadian Government will be ready to this winter, but whether in connection with the Great Lakes treaty or in separate negotiations is a matter for conjecture.

PLEADS GUILTY TO CHARGE OF SEDUCTION, FINED \$500

GODERICH, Oct. 30.—Maitland Fisher of Grey Township appeared before Magistrate C. A. Reid, charged with the seduction of a young girl of the age of 18 years. The young man pleaded guilty, and the following is Magistrate Reid's judgment:

"I find Maitland Fisher, the defendant, guilty of the offense of seduction, to which he pleaded guilty, and I therefore impose a fine of \$500 and costs of \$12.05, and in default of payment of not less than six months or more than one year in the Ontario Reformatory."

GALT GIRL TAKES BANTING TREATMENT, IMPROVES

GALT, Oct. 30.—Elsie Needham, a 11-year-old Galt girl, is in the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, receiving the diabetes treatment, discovered by Dr. Banting of that city. The child was taken into the institution in an unconscious condition, and while other medical men held out no hope for her recovery, she has improved wonderfully, and has been able to write a letter to her father.

CYCLIST BURNED WHEN MACHINE CATCHES FIRE

When his motorcycle took fire at the corner of Piccadilly and Colborne streets at 5:25 o'clock last night, Chester Taylor was badly burned. The machine, which bore license No. 448, was almost a total wreck when the firemen arrived.

After medical attention had been given him, the cyclist was taken to his home.

C. P. R. DECLINES RULING OF CONCILIATION BOARD

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—The Canadian Pacific Railway has declined to accept the recent ruling of a conciliation board that the company should have no reduction at present in the wages of clerks, checkers, freight handlers, baggage men and certain other grades of men employed by the company. The deputy minister of labor has been notified to this effect.

STEAMER IS DISABLED.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 30.—The steamer freighter Valdez, operated by the Alaska Steamship Company, was partly disabled in a terrible storm off the Alaska coast yesterday, but was able to proceed toward Cape Spencer, under her own steam, according to radio messages received today.

PRINCE CHARMING SCORES AT GRAND

Brilliant Musical "Box o' Tricks" Delights Large and Enthusiastic Audience.

Bubbling over with wit and repartee, that is both clever and new; complete, to a detail, in action; and surrounded with an extravagant setting of gowns, scenery and music, the Prince Charming Jr., F. Stuart-Whyte's eleventh musical "Box o' Tricks," played its way into the hearts of London theatregoers at the Grand Opera House, Monday night.

DELIGHTS AUDIENCE.

Billy Oswald, as Sandy MacWhale, was responsible for most of the laughs, and that is making him responsible for a lot. His stories and rapid fire had the audience in kinks, and his humor was original and all ways in his inimitable droll Scotch. His wife, Beatrice Carmen, as Lizette, was good too. She is possessed with a double gift, beautiful voice and charming personality, and her songs and leads were well accepted.

IS FINISHED DANCER.

And the astounding fact, as recounted by Mr. Whyte, is that Miss Laforest is playing her first year on the stage. Miss Laforest is a natural actress and a gifted dancer. The chorus was excellent. The girls are pretty and their singing is good to listen to. Their many ensemble songs were well received. "Prince Charming Jr." will be repeated tonight and twice on Wednesday.
