

Paisley, Ont., Oct. 29 .- Paisley rate payers, becoming tired of waiting for the hydro commission to erect the proposed hydro transmission line from Chesley to Paisley, which work was authorized by an almost unanimous vote last summer, are now considering the construction of a generating plant of their own on the Little Saugeen River about a mile from the village. Should the scheme prove feasible and the cost of power be less than that supplied by the hydro commission, the new dam and generating plant will
