## CHILD WELFARE WORK PROSPERS

Nurses Make 2,202 Visits and Hold 105 Clinics, Caring For 1,711.

The London Child Welfare Association has just completed four months of successful work carried on under the supervision of Mrs. James Stapleton, acting director of nurses, during the absence of Miss Bertha Smith, Miss Smith, who has been abroad for the past few months, expects to return to London about the middle of July.

Mrs. Stapleton, in a recent report of the work, says that during these four months the work has increased over any corresponding four months.

"In 1924, we held 10 clinics in these four months, with an attendance of 1,627. In 1925, in the same four months, we held 105 clinics, with an attendance of 1,711. The nurses in 1924, in these four months, made 1,370 visits. In 1925, in the same four months, nurses made 2,202 visits. Our attendance at the sick children's clinic at the War Memorial hospital has greatly increased. In 1924, in
