MADE NO CHANGES.

LIQUOR LICENSES GRANTED FOR THE YEAR.

The Same Number Issued—One Extended Saloon License Drops—Who the Licensees Are—Four Licenses Withheld to Secure the Refting of Premises.

HE Liquor License Commissioners of the city yesterday made known the result of their deliberations regarding the granting of licenses for the year which begins at once. They have made no changes whatever. The same number of licenses have been granted, and they are to the same persons, except at the Boswell House, where F. Gaupied displaces T. Jeffery.

The applications of Edward Pantan, Charles Mather, Charles McMillan, Martin Morkin, Jas. W. Martin and John Cooke, were refused. The last two applications were for the old McCallum saloon at the corner of the Market Lane and Market Square, which enjoyed a license up to the present, but for the last year only on an extension. P. J. Watt was refused a retail shop license.
