The Cattle Quarantine Regulations to be at Once Put in Force in British Columbia.

Ottawa, March 17.—The British Columbia members, it is said, have urged on the Premier and Hon. Mr. Tupper that the steamer Douglas be placed at the disposal of the Provincial Government for the purpose of making an exploratory survey of the fishing banks of the Queen Charlotte island. They are sanguine that their request will be granted.

Sir Joseph Hickson, chairman of the Prohibition Commission, was in town to-day, and arranged that the commission should commence work immediately.

WINNIPEG WIRINGS.

Conductors and Brakemen on the C. P. R. Western Division Ordered Out.

Mysterious Horse Disease in Manitoba—Legislators Wined and Dined.

WINNIPEG, March 17.—The agitation among the conductors and brakemen on the Western Division of the C. P. R. culminated in a strike, last night at 12 o'clock.

At that hour nearly all the conductors and brakemen, who had not already been dismissed, and most of the station and yardmen employed on that division, quit work.

It is understood that this action was taken against the rigorous protest of a large majority of the men themselves, and in response to the demand of the representatives of the Brotherhood of the United States, who have been here for the past few days.

There is little sympathy here for the strikers in view of the wages that the men appear to have earned, according to the statement published by the company.

During the busy months last year freight conductors earned from \$85 to \$150 a month, and freight brakemen from \$55 to \$85.

The passenger trains are all impeded, and no doubt the strike will impede freight trains for some time.

A general strike, by order of the Railroad Conductors and Brotherhood of Trainmen, was ordered at midnight, extending over the entire Western division of the C. P. R., including all branch lines from Fort William to Donald.

All the passenger trains out will proceed to their destination and other trains to the terminal points.

The passenger trains were moving to-day, but somewhat irregular in leaving this point.

Mr. H. McMillen, local agent of the Great Northern railway, took charge of the express for the South, while E. Kerr, general traffic agent, accompanied by a number of men, went East to meet the colonist trains now en route.

Some of the regular conductors and brakemen presented themselves on call, this morning, and were despatched to their work.

While the railway authorities find themselves short-handed, every effort is being made to maintain a regular passenger service.

The Manitoba Legislature has adjourned till Monday, to allow the Ministers to attend several banquets arranged to take place throughout the province.

The police are making efforts to ascertain what became of those boxes and their contents.

The question, who Williams really is, and how he lived remains a mystery.

When he first came to Rainhill he was half-fellow, well met, and the inhabitants, but he never gave an inkling of his personal history.

After being absent from the hotel all day he used to frequently return covered with dirt, explaining his dirty appearance by saying that he had been putting new floors in a house.

After living at the villa a few days he returned, saying that he could not sleep there, that his sister and her children had gone away and his plans were unworkable.
