Canadian Produce to Receive Special Attention at Liverpool.

Plan for Deportation of United States Silver Has Been Postponed.

Vulgar Post Cards Will Receive Close Attention by the Postmasters.

OTTAWA, Aug. 1.—J. A. Rudick, Canadian dairy commissioner, who with several other horticultural experts is visiting England to investigate methods of export of dairy produce, writes that there is a contemplation of the sending of between four and five million dollars' worth of increased shipping and cargo accommodation at Liverpool docks, the purpose being to provide some extra facilities for cold storage of Canadian produce there.

The office of Dominion bookkeeper, vacated by John Fraser, will not be filled for some weeks. The duties are being discharged temporarily by one of the clerks.

The banks have been notified of a postponement in putting into effect the plan to get rid of United States silver in Canada. The delay is not caused by any serious obstacle, but arrangements for deporting silver will take longer than at first anticipated.

It is estimated that between \$800,000 and \$800,000 worth of United States silver has come across the border.

Vulgar Post Cards
The announcement that the postal authorities of the United States intend to take drastic measures to put a stop to the circulation through the mails of indecent or vulgar post cards has not been lost sight of by the postal authorities here. There is an express provision in postal regulations against the use of the mails for the transmission of obscene or immoral books, pamphlets, pictures, prints, engravings, lithographs, photographs, or anything of a similar character. Occasionally vulgar post cards may pass through the mails, but as a rule the authorities detect them, and some hundreds have been destroyed within the past year.

Postmasters will be warned again to keep a sharp lookout for this class of mail matter.

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BRITAIN'S COAL SUPPLY.

London, Aug. 1.—Questioned further in the House of Commons today on reports of the purchase of a coal area in South Wales by a German syndicate, Premier Balfour again stated that, so far as the government was aware there was no German syndicate in treaty for any area containing coal in the British Isles. He said that the government was not prepared to consider any such proposal.

WILL CONTEST SETTLED.

Litigation Over \$150,000 Baking Powder Estate Avoided.

KING OSCAR'S STATEMENT.

Stockholm, Aug. 1.—King Oscar has caused the information to be circulated in Stockholm, Christiania and Copenhagen, the capital of Norway, that he would accept or leave the Scandinavian countries, that Emperor William made no proposals to him at the Gastein meeting of the two monarchs which involved the least menace to the tranquility of North Europe.
