

NO TAMPERING WITH THE LISTS

Opposition Ground Defined by
Amendment Offered in
House

A MAKER OF AFFIDAVITS

Further Light Thrown on Pur-
chase of Land at St.
Boniface

Ottawa, May 7.—In the House of Commons today, Mr. Roche resumed the debate on the Elections bill. He said that in his opinion the Ontario elections could not be held on the same day, June 8, if they had proper lists. The Liberals were up against this difficulty. They had to either keep the lists without an appeal or they had to run the risk of having the elections thrown over and having a bye-election. This, he contended, was a justification for the passing of the present bill in order that there might be a proper machine for electing to date, they forgot that there was an annual revision and that the lists would be thoroughly revised up to June 1 of this year. Dr. Roche said the prime minister was badly advised by his followers in pressing this legislation.

Dr. Roche read a telegram from Hon. Robert Rogers, saying that several of the affidavits read yesterday by Mr. Roche had been sold to Mr. Walton, the Liberal organizer, by one Rodeski for \$25. Rodeski had served several terms in the common jail and was now a fugitive from justice. Dr. Roche moved the following resolution:

"That this house affirms that the Dominion Election Act should be effectively amended during the present session in order to prevent corrupt practices and ensure honest elections but that the discrimination against the provinces of Manitoba and British Columbia created by the first section of the proposed bill is not founded upon any inquiry, report or other sufficient information, and that the departure from the principle of acceptance of provincial voters' lists and is invidious and unjustifiable."

Dr. Roche concluded by announcing that if the government persisted in going on with the bill, the opposition might refuse to grant further supplies.

Mr. Crawford of Portage La Prairie followed Dr. Roche in support of the bill. Before the public accounts committee today, Commissioner Young of the Transcontinental railway company was examined in regard to purchase of land in St. Boniface for railway terminals, from Keene. His bill proposed to purchase 100 acres of land at \$125 an acre, but subsequently it passed the Hon. Robert Rogers and E. K. Mackenzie of Moose Jaw, who in turn offered it to the commission for \$2,000 an acre.

Fort Garry Union Station.
Winnipeg, May 7.—The contract for the construction of the Fort Garry Union station in Winnipeg will be awarded within ten days, said D. D. Mann, vice-president of the Canadian Northern Railway today.

The various interests will meet today in Ottawa, and the formalities in connection with the contract will then be concluded.

Klondike Concessions Case.
Ottawa, May 7.—The Supreme court today was engaged on an appeal from one of the late Justice Burdidge's judgments at Dawson City last January, that of the Justice of the Peace, E. H. Bronson and C. C. Ray concerning the concession of the King, giving the E. H. Bronson and C. C. Ray concessions. The minister of the interior cancelled the lease for failure to expend \$5,000 in active and diligent operation of the mines as required by the regulations. The late judge upheld this action, but the company appealed against this decision.

SENATE PROCEEDINGS.
Proposed Restoration of Railway Law to Former Condition—Georgian Bay Railway.

Ottawa, May 7.—In the senate last night Senator Casgrain gave notice of an amendment to the railway act, the object of which is to return to the conditions of the law of 1902. "As it is now, operation expenses are a charge on the property of a railroad. That makes the operating expenses rank ahead of bonds. His bill proposes to make operating expenses a first charge on the earnings, as was the case before 1902, and have the bonds mortgage a first charge on the property."

Schoolroom Ceiling Collapses.
London, Ont., May 7.—The entire ceiling of a room in St. George's public school collapsed at noon today, just as about fifty of the pupils were leaving for lunch. Some fifteen or twenty were slightly injured.

Safe Blower Set at Liberty.
Montreal, May 7.—"Kid" alias James McManus, admitted to be one of the most expert safe blowers in the world who was being detained here awaiting extradition to France on the charge of blowing open the safe of the American Express company in Paris in 1901, was liberated today by Judge Choquette, on the ground that there was no proof that the prisoner was the man wanted in connection with the robbery.

O'Donoghue, K.C., legal adviser to the organized labor bodies of the country, to appear before the committee and present their views regarding the old age pension system in the Dominion.

Tried to Blackmail.

F. AUGUSTUS HEINZE

Butte Man Demands Money

From Him and is Taken

Into Custody

New York, May 7.—A Butte, man named Brennan was placed under arrest today on the charge of endeavoring to blackmail F. Augustus Heinze, the noted mining operator.

Brennan is 31 years old, and his people are said to be prominent residents of Butte. He is now in the police court immediately after his arrest. He was being taken to the police station for examination. According to a detective of the district attorney's office, who made a statement to the press, Brennan was several days ago after having been in communication with Mr. Heinze for some time. The complaint which led to his arrest was made by Mr. Heinze at the district attorney's office yesterday. He said that an attempt was being made to extort money from him, that Brennan had told him that he (Heinze) had violated the laws of Montana in some of his copper transactions there, and he charged that Brennan threatened to start the law after Heinze if he was not paid \$40,000. The first threats were made by letter, according to Heinze, and eventually he was taken to Butte and placed in his Broadway office.

After these notes had been cut and passed over to the Butte man, a detective placed him under arrest.

Pennsylvania Road's Tunnel.
New York, May 7.—Sixteen and a half miles of tunnel work, comprising the Pennsylvania railroad's underground system of approaches to the centre of New York city, were completed today when the second of the Bore through Bore in Jersey City, was holed through.

Cotton Strike May End.
Montreal, May 7.—The strike of the cotton mill workers is still going on, but signs of discord are breaking out in the union, and it would not be surprising if the collapse would come within a short time, especially as the mill owners do not appear to be in the least concerned as to whether or not their employees return to work.

The action of the employees of the Magog mills in refusing to go out has had a somewhat depressing effect.

Hindus Want to Be Deported.
Vancouver, May 7.—Two tired, homeless and indigent Hindus have applied to Dr. Monro, immigration officer, to have themselves deported to India. The application is a novel one. Under the law, immigrants who are to be shipped back at the expense of the steamship company.

Boy Rescued.
New Westminster, May 7.—Walter Cambridge, one of the smallest of the Province's new boys in this city, was rescued from a watery grave in the Fraser river last night by the heroic action of Walter Davis. Young Cambridge was too eager in handling a paper to a man on a steamer lying at the C.P.R. wharf and lost his balance and fell into the water between the dock and the vessel. Walter Davis who lives at the Depot hotel, jumped to the aid of the boy and managed to get hold of him when he came up the second time and held him till assistance was given by several persons who saw the mishap. Walter was taken at once to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. F. Cambridge, 414 Fourth avenue, and is suffering from but slight consequences of his accident.

BRITISH BUDGET LESSENS TAXES

Unexpected Announcement is
Made to House by Pre-
mier Asquith

SUGAR DUTY IS DECREASED

Old Age Pension Proposal
Warmly Attacked by
Unionists

London, May 7.—The new budget presented to the House of Commons today reduces the duty on sugar from four shillings and two pence to one shilling and 10 pence per hundred. The budget was presented by the premier, Mr. Asquith, instead of by the chancellor of the exchequer, Mr. McKinnon, of Winnipeg, as was expected. This departure from precedent is a result of the recent changes in the cabinet. Mr. Asquith, after commenting briefly on the present state of the world, following the boom year of 1907, announced that Great Britain realized a surplus for the year 1907 amounting to \$23,830,000, which he said would be largely applied to the reduction of the national debt, which had already been reduced by approximately \$90,000,000 during the past year. Mr. Asquith estimated the total expenditure for 1908-09 at \$764,345,000, and the revenue on the existing basis of taxation at \$738,000,000. The reduction in the sugar duties will be effective May 18 on raw and refined sugar, and July 1 on articles manufactured of sugar.

Pension Scheme Attacked.

London, May 8.—Premier Asquith's pension scheme is hotly attacked by the Unionist newspapers this morning on the ground that Mr. Asquith recklessly started plans requesting millions but left the details of the scheme to his successor in the chancellorship. The discussion in parliament last night, both in the House and in the lobbies, however, left the impression that the cleverly designed budget is likely to be fairly well received. It was generally supposed that it would propose increases in taxation, instead of which, while retaining the sugar duty and proposed no new or increased taxes. The criticism was directed to the details of the pension system, especially by the members of the Labor party, who were little doubt that it will be adopted without serious opposition.

Land for S. A. Veterans.

Montreal, May 7.—At a meeting of the South African veterans' association last night it was resolved to forward to the Dominion government a petition for allotment of land in the Northwest to each soldier.

Former Mayor Drawn.

Montreal, May 7.—The body of Albert Barthelemy, 61 years old, former mayor of St. Genevieve, was found in the river near there yesterday.

It is supposed that he was killed while suffering from Alzheimer's.

Proposed Increase in Rates.

New York, May 7.—The presidents of practically all the leading railway systems east of the Mississippi river met in conference today at the G.T.P. association offices today, considering the question of a general advance in rates. It was believed that his meeting from New York to Chicago as a basis divides rates into six classes. No conclusion was reached today, but the advance most favored class for an increase of 10 cents in the maximum and 25 cents as the minimum.

AWAITING RESCUE

FROM WRECKED SHIP

Men on German Vessel Peter

Rickmers in Dangerous

Position

New York, May 7.—Their lives in peril, one hundred men aboard the German four-masted schooner Peter Rickmers, lying ashore at Zach's Inlet, 20 miles from the entrance of New York harbor, are anxiously awaiting rescue from their dangerous positions on the stranded craft, which threatened to break up at any moment by the terrific storm which is raging at sea tonight.

Standing on shore and watching the wreck which lies a quarter of a mile seaward, are fifty life savers, who have all day been attempting to rescue the men. The efforts of the life savers to bring the shipwrecked men ashore by means of the breeches buoy have been frustrated by the furious wind, and any attempt to launch a surf boat would have been folly, on account of the heavy seas.

The men aboard the stranded vessel number forty of the ship's crew and about sixty life savers. The Peter Rickmers was wrecked on the night of May 5, when the ship was driven ashore by a gale of wind. She constantly broke over the ship, opened up the vessel's seams and allowed the water to pour in. She continued to pound on the beach today, and tonight lies a hopeless wreck. The life savers at the nearest station have established a perilous position of the ship, and tried by every means to get the breeches buoy in position to save the men.

Today began with a gale of wind and heavy seas. The Peter Rickmers was driven ashore by a gale of wind. She constantly broke over the ship, opened up the vessel's seams and allowed the water to pour in. She continued to pound on the beach today, and tonight lies a hopeless wreck. The life savers at the nearest station have established a perilous position of the ship, and tried by every means to get the breeches buoy in position to save the men.

Finally life savers from other stations were called on for assistance until the number totalled twenty-six. From midnight until dawn the rescue was fruitless, and late tonight it was decided to send the noted crew from Zach's Hook to undertake the rescue of the shipwrecked men ashore from the seaward.

Must Provide Fenders.
Toronto, May 7.—The Ontario railway commission has ordered the Toronto street railway to equip all its cars with one of three approved types of fenders within six months.

Young Galician Murdered.
Toronto, May 7.—Alex. Leitick, a Galician, is the name of a young man found dead near Brampton. The post-mortem examination reveals the fact that his death was caused by a blow on the head which fractured the jaw between the ear and chin. The police decline to say whether they have discovered anything that will establish the identity of the murderer.

Women's Mission Work.
Toronto, May 7.—At the annual meeting of the Women's Foreign Mission society of the Presbyterian church in Canada, yesterday, Rev. C. McKinnon, of Winnipeg, delivered a helpful address. Satisfactory reports from the societies at Minnedosa, Winnipeg and other points in the West, Indian, Chinese and Japanese in Western Canada and home mission reports were presented by Mrs. Bell, Miss Craig and Miss Reid.

Proposed Change of Time.
Regina, Sask., May 7.—It is likely that the summer train schedule of the Regina will rise and retire according to the hours of the "fast" train, which is expected to be introduced. Regina will set forward an hour to catch up with Winnipeg and other places, and the whole of Saskatchewan will adopt the central standard time. The movement is gradually spreading westward, and the board of trade of this city takes it up, as it is expected to do, the adoption of the time in Regina is practically assured.

**EDMONTON DISTRICT
HAS GOOD OUTLOOK**

Greatly Increased Acreage in
Crop—Improvements
Around City

Edmonton, May 7.—Reports received by the Edmonton board of trade up to date indicate that seeding operations are being completed in the Edmonton district. The farmers of Stony Plain, Strathcona River, Clover Lake, Baronsburg, Lake, Bear River, Riviere aux Barres, Albert, Onaway, Rabbit Hills, Tofield, Leduc, Vegreville, Vermilion, Daysland, Camrose, Wetaskiwin and other settlements surrounding Edmonton are at least three weeks ahead as compared with last year.

The area under crop will show an increase of from 20 to 30 per cent. A great deal of wheat will be sown, it is expected, and for what will reach a high figure.

Edmonton is busy, but generally speaking there are more people seeking work in all lines than are actually required. Jasper Avenue and Nananimo avenues are being paved and double tracked for street railway purposes. The G.T.P. is making rapid progress in grading the yards and city belt line.

Many building permits are being taken out. Up to the end of April permits amounting to \$1,444,800 were taken out, and for the first six days of May permits for \$1,550 for five hundred and twenty-five houses were issued. There was, however, sufficient number of mechanics at present in the city to do the work hand. Considerable property has changed hands, the best average property selling at \$800 per foot frontage in the centre of the city and further west at \$200 to \$300 per foot frontage. Residential lots are selling freely for building purposes.

Homesteaders are pouring into the city and locating to the west and north. The rush in the latter shows an increase of 50 per cent. over last year. Homestead entries for April numbered 528, and 84,400 acres of land were taken.

Edmonton and Strathcona will have a creditable exhibit at the Dominion fair and will fill ten times the space allotted to each.

The by-law to grant a franchise to the American-Canadian Oil Co. was heavily endorsed by the ratepayers of Strathcona yesterday. The vote standing 596 for 36 against. The company has now got franchises from Edmonton, Strathcona, Morinville and St. Albert corporations, and is now all ready to commence work. The Strathcona agreement is very similar to the one in Edmonton and gives a franchise for fifteen years. The company is now engaged in boring wells at Morinville, Egg Lake and Edson. The company states that it will begin the laying of pipes in Edmonton and Strathcona this fall, and will be in a position to supply gas next year.

Indian Agent.
Belleville, Ont., May 7.—Joseph Stainton, of Deseronto, has been appointed to the position of Indian agent for the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte.

Toronto's Electric Power.
Toronto, May 7.—The contract between the city of Toronto and the hydro-electric power commission was today officially signed for the city by Mayor Oliver and City Treasurer Coudy. The contract was signed by the city and the commission.

Grain Inspection.
Ottawa, May 7.—It is understood that the amendments to the Manitoba grain inspection act will make provision for the establishment of a city of sample grain market, through which millers and others may purchase grain on sample and export it in standard grades.

Refused Admission.
Lethbridge, May 7.—Canadian Immigration Agent Humphrey refused admittance at Coultas, on the American boundary line, to twenty negroes coming from the United States, stating that they were going to do irrigation work at Calgary.

LIST OF VICTIMS IS INCREASED

Body of Another Man Caught
in Mrs. Guinness' Net
Identified

ENTICED FROM WISCONSIN

Apparent Attempt Made By
Men to Tamper With
Corpses

Laporte, Ind., May 7.—The identification of another of the bodies dug up on the Guinness farm near here as that of Ole Budeberg, of Iowa, Wis., and evidence that he, like Andrew Heiglein, of Mansfield, S.D., had been brought into Mrs. Bella Guinness' net through matrimonial advertisements, was one of the clarifying features of today's developments of the case. The identification of the body of Budeberg was made by the man's sons, Matt and Oscar H. Budeberg, who arrived here this afternoon.

A soaking rain which fell continually for twenty-four hours prevented further excavation of the premises today, and Sheriff Smutser devoted the day to gathering possible evidence that may be used in the trial of Ray Lamphere on the charge of having caused the deaths of Mrs. Guinness and her three children.

Voluntarily information has been poured in since the case acquired such notoriety. Among these communications received today was a letter purporting to come from a Vera Shoren, of Indianapolis. It was addressed to Alex. Heiglein, and was to the chief of police. The writer said he had positive evidence that Mrs. Guinness was still alive and urged that attention be given to the communication. The explanation of the mistake was revealed when a detective agency asked Heiglein to employ their man in unravelling the mystery revealed by Mrs. Shoren.

Coroner Mack denied that he had come to the conclusion that the Sorensen girls and Philip Guinness had been killed before their bodies were precipitated into the basement of their mother's burning home on April 22.

What the authorities have declared was an attempt to disturb the bodies dug out on the Guinness farm so that identification of the remains would be impossible, was made today.

Those identically is not known, broke into the carriage house of the farm, where the bodies were placed, before they could do harm. The authorities are searching for the men.

Daniel M. Heston said that the men claimed to be doctors and had attempted to justify their presence in the place on professional grounds. They refused to go until they learned that Joseph Heiglein had been sent to the sheriff. The men gained entrance to the carriage house by placing a ladder on the side of the building and forcing open a window.

Roy Lamphere, under arrest in connection with the crime, has declared that Mrs. Guinness had urged him to insure his life in her favor, asserting that she had offered to pay the premiums on such a policy provided that he agreed to marry her. He said that he believed that his refusal to fall in with her plans had caused the enmity which the latter manifested toward him, resulting in his arrest on three occasions and his trial before a lunacy commission on a fourth.

Lamphere's statement was made in a closed room in the Guinness home, to which he asserts he was always denied admission, in particular by Maxon, who was working on the farm when the house caught fire on April 22. Maxon asserted that he had never been allowed access to the second story of the farm house, where the second room was located.

Also Heiglein, of Mansfield, S. D., was again in conference with Dr. C. F. Mack, coroner of the county, today. The steps by which his brother Andrew became infatuated with the woman were canvassed once more, but only partial progress was made toward clearing the mystery. Heiglein told again of the secret to which the brother had shrouded his movements before his departure from South Dakota. Enough was revealed to show the advertisements for matrimonial agency had been printed in Scandinavian papers in the northwest. Heiglein asserting that a single sheet printed in Norwegian and full of such notices had been circulated among his acquaintances.

The circumstances leads the investigators here to believe that Mrs. Guinness was established communication with her victims through this agency, this promise accounting for her relations with Ole Budeberg.

Because of heavy rain it was decided shortly before noon that no further digging would be done upon the Guinness farm today.

No Labor Candidate.
Ottawa, May 7.—The labor interests of Ottawa have decided not to enter candidates for the coming provincial elections. The matter was considered by the allied trades and labor association.

Fire in New Orleans.
New Orleans, May 7.—Twelve hours after it was thought that the fire which last night destroyed the stores of S. F. H. Haggall and Bro., and H. B. Stevens & Co., on Canal street had been extinguished, it broke out this morning in the store owned by the Dreyfus Company, Limited, next to the burned buildings. The Dreyfus building, with a large stock of dry goods, was destroyed, thus bringing the total losses to \$500,000 or \$600,000.

LAKE ONTARIO STORM.
Strong East Wind Lashes Water—The Repair Work Around Toronto is Retarded.

Toronto, May 7.—Lake Ontario has been lashed into fury by the action of a strong east wind. According to reports received from exposed locations on the island and on the lake shore both east and west, and from captains on lake steamers, the storm which is raging today equals if it does not exceed that of a few weeks ago.

INVITED TO KLONDIKE
Elaborate and Costly Cards to Be Presented to Earl Grey, Premier and Laurier and President Roosevelt.

Vancouver, May 7.—En route to Ottawa to visit Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Earl Grey, from thence to Washington, where President Roosevelt will be interviewed, Harry J. Landahl, one of Dawson's most prominent business men, who is also past Arctic chief of Dawson camp No. 4, of the Arctic Brotherhood and representative of Dawson's active board of trade, is in Vancouver today.

Mr. Landahl is awaiting the arrival at the coast of three specially prepared invitations, which will be presented personally to the Premier and Governor General of the Dominion and to the President of the United States, inviting them to visit the Klondike at the close of the Alaska-Yukon expedition.

The making of these "invitation cards," each of which will cost at least \$100, is being rushed to completion, and in three weeks' time they will be in the hands of Mr. Bard, of Seattle, past Grand Arctic Chief of the Arctic Brotherhood, who, with Mr. Landahl, will convey them to the celebrities to whom they are addressed.

IMMIGRANT INSPECTION
Customs Officer at Prince Rupert to Act for Department of Interior at That Point.

Vancouver, May 7.—As a result of the extensive boundary inspection avowedly inaugurated by the Dominion government between Vancouver and the great lakes, further action has been taken by the Ottawa authorities, and this week the first step to preclude all undesirable from Prince Rupert was taken. The department of the interior has sent instructions to the customs officer of the G.T.P. terminal city to take upon himself the additional duty of inspecting all officers and enforce to the limit the new order-in-council, which excludes from admittance into Canadian territory all intending immigrants not holding tickets purchased by themselves direct from the land of their birth or citizenship, besides all persons morally or physically undesirable.
