

FROM THE ANTIPODES.

EX-CHAMPION HANLAN EXPECTED IN A FEW DAYS.

They wouldn't come to him and so he went to them and met them on their native waters, with everything that climate and knowledge could give him in his favor. Let us, therefore, honor Edward Hanlan, the World's unassailable pluck. Those who sought him couldn't defeat him, so he sought those who thought they had a chance in order to give them an opportunity. Any man in this world who goes to work to give his adversary every imaginable advantage must in the long run be a loser. Hanlan never gave any man an advantage, he never gave any man who came against him, not only rowed them, but went to their own waters and gave them as many chances as they wished. At last he met a man who held four of a kind against his full and was left. That is speaking in a language that people like to ignore and yet know very well. It describes the situation and for that reason is used. Hanlan was bound to be beaten in this. His corner all through may not have been the wisest, and we ourselves think if he had shrewdly, cautiously David W. Foster had been a better man to have had as his opponent. He was a man as he is, always remembering what he has done, and that defeat did not hurt him, but that he courted it. The World's champion was firmly persuaded by that on neutral waters or on his own bay that the man that beat him in a race was not a man of thirty years old—that is nearly—while his opponent is 35, and, therefore, with judicious care and management should have years of supremacy before him yet.
