The Scotchmen do throw a wicked stone. Practically all the London and Western Ontario curlers who lined up against the visitors yesterday will admit it.

"Birds of a feather flock together." This was the slogan adopted by the Scots before they left for Canada, and they tended to order 23 suits off the same bit of cloth. The Scotch curlers arrived here in uniform dress and it was sure a novel idea.

Col. Robertson-Alkman was undecided about making the trip to Canada, but after numerous requests he decided to again head the party. The colonel is enjoying his second trip through the Dominion as captain of the Scotch curlers, having been here in 1912.

There is a possibility that the next time the Scots come to Canada Robertson-Alkman, Jr., will accompany the party. The colonel's son is now 21 years of age and is anxious to come out on an expedition.

A wire was received from Chicago by the Scots last night, asking them if they would remain in the American city about one hour and 30 minutes longer if arrangements could be made with the railway company. The touring curlers will spend the extra time, providing suitable train connection is arranged.

There were two of the Scots missing yesterday from the party. J. B. Jupp stopped off in Toronto to visit relatives and Capt. Angus Gilmore is ill in Montreal Hospital.

John Clark, gamekeeper for Col. Robertson-Alkman, formerly enjoyed the trip to London, and former friends renewed acquaintances with Mr. Clark at the Loys street rink.

James T. Ward is a wine merchant at South Brae Drive, Jordanhill, Glasgow, when he is home. If the Londoners only knew that yesterday he would have been the most popular man in the party.

The American curlers have a fine treat in store for the Scotchmen when they cross the border, according to reports. Many of the Scotchmen have already received letters from the American friends, stating that they are anxious to meet them.

Twelve of the Scotch curlers are farmers in Scotland, but farming is not in it when it comes to curling. If these 12 farm like they curl, they sure would take in a bumper crop.

The Scotchmen want to spend a week in this part of the country the next time they tour the Dominion. This is a sure sign that they enjoy a royal time here.

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Many of the Londoners are living in hopes that they will be chosen members of the Canadian party to visit Scotland in three years.
