BROOKE COUNCIL.

Alvinston, 1st June, 1912.
Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present.
Minutes of previous meeting read, and on motion of Mr. Monro, seconded by Mr. Annett, were approved.
Report of Engineer read, on the proposed repairs to the Weidman Drain across part of the 9th concession. Estimated cost, \$375.00, \$285.00 of which was assessed to Brooke and \$75.00 to Emmiskillen.
Fisher—Annett, that report be accepted and Clerk instructed to prepare necessary by-law for submission at next meeting, to authorize the work and borrow the sum required.—Carried.
Application was made by Mr. Neil Graham for aid to grade up properly the flats on the south side of the McKellar bridge, Con. 1. Considerable gratis help was promised.
Fisher—Monro, that the grading of these flats be left to Commissioner Annett, with power to employ men and teams.—Carried.
By-law submitted to borrow the sum of \$2077.00, being the Township's share of the cost of tiling the 15-16 sideroad drain, across concessions 5 and 6.
Monro—Sutton, that by-law be provisionally adopted, printed in pamphlet form and copies thereof served on parties assessed, with notice that a court of revision on by-law would be held in the Orange Hall in the Village of Inwood, on Saturday, the 6th day of July, 1912. Mr. Annett to be commissioner and to serve by-laws.—Carried.
Sutton—Fisher, that Council open as a court of revision on the Holbrook Drain By-law, the Reeve in the chair.—Carried.
Declarations taken. Two appeals.
E. H. Shirley said lots 7, 8 and 9 w hfg should be assessed some, as drain acts as a cut off to them.
Herbert Holbrook said, I believe lot E hfg should be assessed as high as mine. The drains on my lot are to carry the water brought on it from the east.
Fisher—Monro, that the Engineer's assessment in by-law be adopted without any change

Sutton—Monro, that the foregoing reductions, changes and additions be confirmed, ordered to be made in roll by Clerk and roll then adopted and court closed.—Carried.

Darvill—Monro, that an order for \$500 be drawn in favor of the Township's solicitors, in full settlement of any liability for damages for which the Township may be liable in the Calhoun claim.—Carried.

Fisher—Monro, that the Engineer be instructed to examine the locality, lay out the drain and report to Council.—Carried.
Morley Zavitz asked that the 9th con drain opposite lot 13 be repaired.

Fisher—Monro, that the Engineer be requested to examine this drain, and if found out of repair, to report with a view to enable Council to take steps to repair same.—Carried.

Sutton—Fisher, that Commissioner Monro be authorized to make needed repairs to the 9th con drain, for the purpose of erecting three steel bridges, and to authorize the submission of same to a vote of the qualified electors on the 20th day of June, 1912. Loans to be by issue of debentures payable in ten equal annual installments.

Sutton—Monro, that by-law be provisionally adopted, published for three successive weeks in the Alvinston Free Press newspaper, and that the following parties be appointed as Deputy Returning Officers to take the vote, at their respective polling places, viz—James Y. McKewen, John McAlpine, T. J. Oakes, George Lightfoot, W. J. Weed, John McLean, Samuel Johnston, William Brown, Howard Shirley, Wallace Watson and Dan McDonald.—Carried.

Darvill—Monro, that by-law be provisionally adopted and submitted to a vote of the electors (at the same time as the vote is taken to borrow \$10,000 for bridges), to borrow the sum of \$3900 to carry out the agreement entered into with the village of Alvinston for the erection of a joint town hall in the Village. Debentures for loan to be spread over a period of five years.—Carried.

Darvill—Fisher, that the salary of the members of Council (except that of Reeve) be fixed at \$75.

Monro—Fisher, that the acceptance or rejection of the tender received for the job of the repairs to the 12th concession drain, be left to the Commissioner for same.—Carried.

Sutton—Monro, that Council do now adjourn till the 13th day of July, on Saturday, the 6th day of July, 1912.—Carried.
