NEWSPAPER SUSPENSIONS

(Reprinted from the Financial Post, July 17th)

The reduction in the number of daily newspapers by suspensions, absorptions and amalgamations, is not alone due to higher paper and other costs, but to changing conditions in the newspaper business, and is likely to continue for we are entering upon most critical times for them.

The main supply of world wide news is now furnished by the Associated Press and several other news gathering services. Exactly the same general, and much of the local, news appear in every daily newspaper in Canada. The same condition exists in the advertising columns. This standardization of news and advertising service is likely to go on steadily improving and the publication of more than one good morning or evening paper in a centre is becoming very much of a wasteful duplication of effort. A good daily paper, even in the smallest centres, is well worth and should be sold for five cents, and a family should be content with one.

Rural weeklies, national weeklies and periodicals are in a different class. Their contents are entirely original. That is, they do not appear in any other publication. They are becoming increasingly more expensive to produce. The reading matter in a single issue of a leading Canadian magazine costs more than eight to ten times the whole reading contents in a leading daily paper.

The Free Press, Forest, Ontario, refers to the passing out, because of increased costs within the last few years, of eight of the fifteen newspapers published in Lambton County. This will be regretted by those who know country life in Canada. A rural weekly and small city daily is more of a public institution than a money making enterprise. There are few editors of rural and smaller daily papers who are not underpaid, self sacrificing public servants. They give more to their communities, and when they are leaders, as so many are, commanding respect and confidence, their papers are a great power. The Financial Post is in cordial sympathy with the action of Parliament in continuing to in spite of the opposition of the big city dailies for whom R. L. Richardson, spoke-to-transport rural weeklies free of charge in their local districts. Another phase of good work these local papers do is to keep those who go out into the world, to the big centres and foreign parts, in touch with their old homes. For that reason we would also favor carrying copies of rural papers going to these subscribers free of postage. This is really a great national service, a good investment for the country. There are few men or women who do not hope to go back to and do something for the old home. If the world treats them well they want to share the good things with the schools, churches and institutions in their old homes. Many of them do. These generous thoughts can be best retained by keeping them constantly in touch with the doings at home. There is only one way—the local newspaper. No matter how busy we are we make time to read that, if it comes to us. At the time these papers were carried free to any subscriber in Canada or in the United States, but Dr. Conlter dropped this very soon after his advent to the Deputy Postmaster General ship. It was a very serious mistake. Thousands of Canadians were cut off who have never since regained touch.

We submit these facts to Parliament with the suggestion that they the M. P.'s seriously consider whether—as a good business proposition—we should not permit these rural weekly and smaller dailies an unlimited free postal area. The investment will be trifling and the return to the nation very profitable.

DELIVERING GOODS BY AEROPLANE

(Maritime Merchant)

In our last issue there appeared an item announcing the purchase of an aeroplane by Brandram Henderson Ltd., and the installation of a delivery service by air from their factory at Montreal to the towns and villages within the central division. Since then, we have seen Mr. George Helliar, the Brandram Henderson manager at Halifax, who recently returned from Montreal, and he has told us more about it. The conception of the aeroplane idea, he says, was that of the President of the company, Mr. George Henderson, and so far it has proved to be the most effective advertising effort that has ever been made in Canada. Other institutions such as County Fairs, Victory Loan Campaigns, etc., have engaged aeroplanes for special stunts, but Mr. Henderson in his venture went further. He bought an aeroplane outright, lock, stock and barrel, and gave it definite duties which it performs with clocklike regularity.

"Up to the time I was in Montreal said Mr. Helliar, "flights had already been made to a large number of places; one to Three Rivers, a distance of 90 miles was made in 50 minutes. On a day when a trip was made to Berthierville, the Mayor of that town proclaimed a public holiday, and on the landing of the aviator, the local band played "See the conquering hero come." I understand that the Brandram Henderson agent there sold over \$900 worth of paint right in the aviation field, within a very few minutes, so impressed were the people by the firm's enterprise. I might say that in each town before making a landing to deliver his freight, the aviator is instructed to circle about for a time, dropping bombs of propaganda for "B. H. English" and "Brandram's B. Genuine White Lead." It is a fine advertising stunt; the most effective that we have ever attempted."

"Perhaps Brandram Henderson will install an air delivery from Halifax," the "Merchant" suggested. "They might but for one thing," said Mr. Helliar. Halifax is without an air drome and until she gets one, there is no use to consider the matter. I must say that it made me quite jealous to see our Central Division getting so much splendid publicity, which we might have shared in if only Halifax had had an air drome. However, we may have our chance yet. An air drome for Halifax is a real necessity today."

"You think then," said the "Merchant" "that the aeroplane delivery is a sound commercial proposition?" "That," said Mr. Helliar "is the view of our President. He believes the aeroplane is bound to have an important place in the merchandising world just as soon as the country will take it seriously, and he hopes that the precedent he has established will be quickly followed by other Canadian Manufacturers."

It should be gratifying to all Maritime Provinces people to hear that a firm born and nurtured in the provinces has been the first to install a goods delivery service by aeroplane in Canada. The only regret we suspect they will have will be that the lack of an air drome at both Halifax and St. John made it impossible for the initial effort to be undertaken from one of these places.

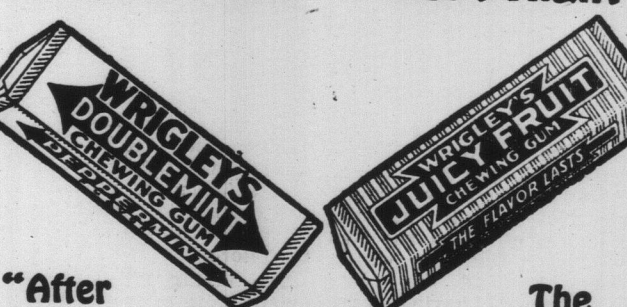
