section of agriculture—usually associated with antiprotection in this country—will be arguing for tariff aid against the United States.

I submit, Mr. Speaker, that this is hardly a correct statement of the facts. I should not want to be described as a person who is anxious to put any blocks in the way of free interchange of products between countries. That is why I took some time to set out that I thought the tariff arrangement between Canada and the United States was most one-sided. All the people of my province want is some equalization of the tariff, so the
