Criminal Code

Mr. Speaker, the 250 Serena monitors who held their convention in Sherbrooke on May 3, 1969—just three days ago—urged the Canadian government to withdraw clause 18 of Bill C-150 on abortion and to establish a Royal commission to study this important matter.

That is a responsible organization. It is not a Créditiste, a Conservative, an N.D.P. or a Liberal organization. It is an honest, non-partisan, separate organization which has considered this question seriously before making its recommendations to the government.

The Minister of Justice sits unconcerned when some of his colleagues are calling us demagogues because we do not want to modernize Christian morality in Canada, by allowing our women to be aborted.

Mr. Speaker, here is a letter from an Englishman, it comes from Ottawa, Ontario—Harding Road—and deals with abortion; those people oppose abortion vehemently.

Mr. Speaker, here is a letter from the Alliance for Life, 13, Boulay St., Hull—in the riding of my hon. friend from Hull (Mr. Isabelle), also on abortion and I quote:

In Poland too abortion was legalized first of all for vague "medical" reasons—

—exactly what is going on in this house.

In 1956, those reasons were extended to include social reasons; to-day Polish laws on abortion are amongst the most permissive in the world.

They made a fiasco of it; so, apparently, it would seem that we in Canada must walk in the footsteps of those who led their nation to the most total and complete fiasco.
