Dear Sir Arthur:

In my letter to you a few days ago, I intimated that I might write to you about coming to Colgate. We now have arrangements made so that I can give you a somewhat formal invitation.

On December 5th we are dedicating a new chemical laboratory, which has just been constructed at the expense of a half million dollars. It is most complete in every way and for the purposes of a college, I think one of the best to be found anywhere. We are anxious to have some man, not a chemist, give the dedicatory address on the afternoon of Friday December 5th, and I am hoping that you can accept the invitation to come.

Trains run from Montreal direct to Utica, and I shall be most pleased to meet you there and bring you to Hamilton, which is thirty miles distant.

The address need not be long, and above all things we do not want it chemically technical, as there is to be a program for the remainder of Friday and Saturday morning on the technical phases of chemistry. This address should be simply from the standpoint of general education.
