tual attitude of the French Canadians should be fairly clearly and comprehensively placed before English-speaking Canadians.

Much has been written and spoken on the question of the Bonne Entente, and as to the best means of assuring a good understanding between the two great races in Canada. But after all there is but one way by which racial concord and national unity can be assured. It is the way which was formulated by the great French Canadian Father of Confederation, George-Etienne Cartier, the honored colleague and companion in arms of that great Englishspeaking Canadian, John A. Macdonald. "My policy and I think it the best is respect for the rights of all," said Cartier. RESPECT FOR THE RIGHTS OF ALL! That is the sole key to racial concord and national unity. Unless that precept is practiced by both races, we can never have anything but division and disunion in Canada
