OFFICIAL RUSSIAN--Our Success South of Pilitza River is of Greatest Importance. Enemy in Retreat on Main Front. GERMAN--Our Troops in Poland Were Forced to Withdraw Before Advancing Fresh Russian Forces.

GERMANS IN RETREAT FROM LA BASSEE TO COAST

RUSSIANS SMASHED FRONT OF AUSTRO-GERMAN ARMY WHOLE FORCE IN RETREAT

Victory of Greatest Importance Gained South of Pilitza River After Four Days of Heavy Fighting--Portion of Austrian Army Enveloped--Great Battle With Austrians Along Whole Front of San.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 28.--The following official communication was issued today from general headquarters: "In the battle which has been in progress for four days south of Pilitza River, in the forests on the line extending from the Bialogora (Bialogora) to Głowaczow, Policzna and Janowice, our troops have inflicted upon the Austro-German forces a severe defeat. Between the Pilitza and Głowaczow the heroic efforts of our troops definitely broke down on Oct. 28 the resistance of the 20th corps and the reserve guard corps of the Germans.

Berlin Admits Defeat. BERLIN, Oct. 28.--(Via Amsterdam and London, 8.22 p.m.)--The German and Austrian troops in Poland, according to an official announcement issued in Berlin today, have been forced to withdraw before fresh Russian forces advancing from Ivangorod, Warsaw and Nowogorodsk, after having repulsed all former Russian attacks.

Radom Has Fallen. LONDON, Oct. 28.--(Via Amsterdam and London, 7.5 miles from Warsaw, has been occupied by Russian troops and the town of Radom has also fallen before the Russian advance.

PRINCE MAURICE OF BATTENBERG SLAIN IN ACTION

Young Cousin of King George Has Succumbed in France.

BROTHERS ALSO SERVING Prince Was an Officer in King's Royal Rifle Corps.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 28, 1 p.m.--Prince Maurice of Battenberg, a cousin of King George and a son of Princess Henry of Battenberg, has been killed on the battlefield in France. He was an officer of the King's Royal Rifle Corps. Prince Maurice was the first member of the British royal family to be killed in the present war. It was reported that the prince was not actually killed on the battlefield, but that he died afterwards from wounds received in an engagement. King George and Queen Mary visited Kensington Palace this afternoon to console with Princess Henry, his mother.

Bavarian Corps Fight British Crown Prince of German State Urges Reprisals for Cunning of Enemy.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 29, 2.40 a.m.--A despatch to Reuters from Amsterdam says: Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, brother of the Belgian Queen, who is commanding the sixth German army corps, has issued the following army order:

1,500,000 MEN NOW ENROLLED

British Army Consists of That Number on the Rolls and Drilling

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 28.--The British army on the rolls and drilling in the United Kingdom now amounts to approximately 1,500,000 men. Of this total about 800,000 men belong to what is termed "Kitchener's Army"--men who have responded to his two calls for 500,000 soldiers to serve three years or for the duration of the war. About 600,000 belong to the territorial, while the remainder are enrolled with the special reserves, so-called, or with the regular army and have seen service previously.

GERMANS ARE FALLING BACK ON LONG LINE

From La Bassee to Coast Reported in Progress.

ALLIES HOLD FIRMLY Native Troops Destroyed Ammunition Park in Night Attack.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 28.--An Evening News despatch dated Northern France and timed 7 o'clock this morning, says: "It is reported here that the Germans are falling back all along the line from La Bassee to the sea."

PARIS, Oct. 28, 11.55 p.m.--The vigor of the German attacks on the north was diminished greatly today after they had carried out two surprise assaults during the night which cost both sides dear.

GERMANS ADMIT PROLONGED WAR

Semi-Official Press Changes Mind--Husbanding of Wheat Resources Urged.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, Oct. 29, 1.42 a.m.--The German semi-official press has now changed its mind and admits that the war is likely to last longer than it originally thought, says Reuters' Amsterdam correspondent.

LULL ALONG BELGIAN COAST. The correspondent at Sluis of the Amsterdam Telegraaf reports that remarkable quiet prevails along the coast of Belgium. The German garrisons at Bruges, Heyst and Knocke, he says, are not very numerous.

CANADIANS MAY HELP TO QUELL BOER UPRISING

Troops From the Dominion Might Be Sent to South Africa.

RENDER EFFECTIVE AID Cpl. Steele Mentioned as Commander of Force If One is Sent.

By a Staff Reporter. OTTAWA, Oct. 28.--While no official communications have passed on the subject, it is considered here not at all improbable that Canadian troops may be sent to South Africa to help put down the rebellion in which Generals De Wet and Beyers with their followers have now joined, as well as to uphold British arms against the Germans in southwest Africa.

Col. Sam Steele of Winnipeg, former head of the Northwest Mounted Police, is spoken of as a good commander for such a force if it should be sent. The possibility of Indian or Australian troops being diverted to South Africa is also discussed here.
