public communications in foreign languages, to abolish all fbreign language associations, and to remove all "party politicians" (obviously including Congress) and "business leaders" (obviously meaning owners and managers) from all their functions."

- A. Might I ask where the quotation is from?
- Q. It is from the San Francisco Chronicle. A. A newspaper?
- A. I have here a full page advertisement by Technocracy.

  A. I have here a full page advertisement which was published in the New York Times on Sunday, March 8th.
- Q. Of what year? ... 1942 -- it is a full page advertisement, the one referred to in that.
- Q. Is this still your policy? A. With your permission I will read this.

MR. BENCE: May I ask, before you go on, what was that a news item?

MR. DUPUIS: It was an advertisement from Technocracy.

THE CHAIRMAN: What are you reading there, is it the advertisement which appeared in the San Francisco paper?

MR. ANDERSON: I think he is reading from a news item reporting the advertisement.

MR. BENCE: Then that would be a newspaper man writing something by way of interpretation of the advertisement.

MR. DUPUIS: No, no.

MR. BENCE: Might I look at it?

MR. DUPUIS: Yos. This advertisement appeared in the San Francisco Chronicle and the day after it appeared the Chronicle denies it with great edictorial vigor in the subsequent issue of the paper.

MR. MacINNIS: That is what you read from?

THE CHAIRMAN: Yes, he read from the editorial.

MR. DUPUIS: In the editorial the day after they criticized the advertisement.
