## **VOMEN VICTIMS OF BIG EXPLOSION**

ench Munition Factory is Blown Up as Result of Accident.

#### MANY LIVES ARE LOST

Force of Explosion Felt Five Hundred Yards Away.

PARIS, Oct. 20.—Fifty-two persons are reported to have been killed in an explosion this afternoon in a factory in the Rue de Tolbiac, while 100 or more were injured.

Many of the victims were women workers in the factory, which was wrecked, as were buildings in the vicinity.

President Poincare and Minister of the Interior Malvy, who were imme-diately informed of the disaster, visit-ed the scene and gave directions to

the rescuing forces.

An auto truck was being loaded when workmen accidentally dropped one grenade causing an explosion which was followed by two others in quick succession.

The explosion destroyed not only the main factory and other buildings connected with it, but everything within a radius of 100 yards and damaged buildings 500 yards distant. The explosion was followed by fire, but the flames were soon extinguished.

Of the 41 bodies already recovered 31 are those of women. Forty injured persons were treated at the emergency hospital which was quickly installed at the scene. Twenty others were removed to another hospital. It was said that the injured would exceed 100 in number.

Reports that the explosion was the result of the work of spies are absolutely denied.

### **TORONTO - OTTAWA TRAIN**

Afternoon Services Between Two Cities in and Out of Ottawa Central Station.

MONTREAL, Oct. 20.—An official statement, issued this morning, announces that with the inauguration of new timetable between Ottawa and Toronto the C. P. R. will use the Sparks street Central Station at Ottawa. In addition to the ordinary morning and night trains, which will make their terminal at the Union Station, two new trains will be introduced, one leaving Ottawa Central Station at 1.15 p.m., to be called "The York" and another leaving Toronto. York," and another leaving Toronto at 1.45 p.m. The new trains will run via Trenton, Kempton and Lake Shore

The date of the beginning of the new service is not yet announced.
