Blue Island, Ill., July 4 .- Four companies of the 15th Infantry, U.S. A. ar rived here from Fort Sheridan, Ill., this morning. A crew composed partly of Rock Island office men, under the directions of General Superintendent Dunlap, was engaged at 9 o'clock in getting the freight car obstructions off the track so as to clear the main line. The sight of the soldiers on guard never before seen in this part of the country had the effect of silencing the strikers and subduing their inclinations to interfere with the work of opening the line to traffic.

A BAYONET CHARGE.

Chicago, July 4.—At 8 o'clock Swift & Co, succeeded in getting out a stailed train of beef which has been on the track at Halstead and 49th street since Monday afternoon. Thirty men from Company B, under command of Capt. Chapin, together with 100 policemen, tookltp a position alongside of the train and marched with it to the Michigan Central tracks. The train went cast at 8.45 a. m. When the soldiers marched back to camp they were followed by a crowd of about 800 men and hoys, who cursed and yelled at the men until Capt. Chapin ordered a charge with bayonets on Haistead street, which had the effect of scattering the crowd.

Chairman Sproule read a letter from a reeve in the county of Grey, suggesting that when an immigrant child shall have committed two offences, the society which has brought it to Canada shall be compelled by law to return it to England. Several members of the committee spoke in favor of this proposi

mittee spoke in favor of this proposition. Deputy Minister Burgass shid the Minister of the Interior had an open mind on the subject of child immigration, This immigration had dropped off very largely in last year. McMillan, of Huron, suggested that the Government cease all hopuses.
