for that Time; it was not then following its wonted Routine of Politicks, in oppressing the Liberty, and confounding the Property of Mankind, nor aggrandizing itself, and every Branch of the Bourbon Family, at the Expence of the House of Austria, and the rest of Europe: No, it was, consonant to Treaties, and, beyond Expectation, supporting the Orleans Branch against the House of Spain. What could be more natural, nay, more neceffary, than for England to join in Measures so well calculated for the Preservation of the Liberties of Europe, and to prevent the Uniting and Junction of which two Branches, fo much Blood and Treasure had been spilt? nay, on our supporting the Orleans Branch, depended the keeping this Family on the Throne.

Nor did we, in this Conjuncture, neglect our own private Interest, for we seiz'd on this Opportunity to destroy the *Spanish* Fleet; which has never been able to give us the least Umbrage since. But before I finish my

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
